John Hall, the bandmaster, has bought the Dr. Oron Howard home, 128 Center street, including 14x10 rods of ground and a five-room house for \$3,000.

Mrs. William O'Brien lost a valuable necklace in the Salt Lake Theater Saturday night. It was found yesterday morning, but crushed and ruined by having been trampled upon.

S. J. Kelly has returned from his newly located ranch on the Uintah reservation, with which he is greatly pleased. Mr. Kelly thinks that the outlook for that section of the state is very promising.

Messrs. O. H. Hewlett and John Q. Critchfield of the manufacturers and Merchant's association have gone to Denver where they will study the methods of the same class of organization there.

Rev. Frank C. Bruner of the Oakwood Union church, Chicago, who is out west on a lecturing tour, expresses himself as very much pleased with Salt Lake, and as desirous of getting up stakes and removing to this city.

The substitutions of the Bell Telephone company have been given distinctive names, a custom obtaining in larger cities, and the designations now given are "Main," meaning the city center; "Forest," meaning Forest; "Dale," district; "Jordan," "Murray" and "Toll."

The attempts to locate the bullet in William Grimsdell's back by the use of the X-rays, have been unsuccessful. The shooting occurred a week ago when two boys accidentally discharged a 22 rifle in the direction of Mr. Grimsdell, and fortunately the affair is not considered serious.

It was "dry Sunday" in Salt Lake yesterday. Orders were issued by saloon keepers Saturday night and they were warned to keep their places locked up tight. Chief Lynch detailed officers to see that the orders were obeyed and as a result every saloon in town was locked both front and back doors.

The congregation of Montefiore of this city was addressed yesterday afternoon by Rabbi C. J. Freund and Senator Simon Bamberger on the means being taken in the United States to relieve the persecuted Jews in Russia. The senator also spoke of the national Jewish convention to be held Dec. 6, which he will attend, as Utah's immigration commissioner.

The following applications for water were filed Saturday afternoon, with the state engineer: By Joseph P. Rudy and Ephraim Twitchell of Vernal, for 2 1/2 second feet of water from the Utah river for irrigating 329 acres; by Otto Hill of Denver, for 2 second feet of water from the Utah river to irrigate 160 acres; and by James J. The blow was a friendly one administered by Frank Cox, a week ago; and at the time caused him to almost lose consciousness. Physicians state that the vertebra could have been bent, but very slightly out of place, or the blow would not have jarred it back into position, as was apparently the case.

"PEACE! BE STILL!"

Subject of Interesting Lecture by Dr. James E. Talmage.

A most interesting session of the University Sunday school was held yesterday. The attendance for that day was that of any other day, and everyone seemed intensely interested in the discussion by Dr. Talmage, of the beautiful and inspiring theme, "Peace, Be Still."

The song, "Peace, Be Still!" particularly suited to the subject of the lecture, was sung by a quartet composed of Messrs. Margaret Sumner, Esther Cornell and Messrs. George M. Cannon, Jr. and Noel Pratt, with making answer to several questions and enquiries submitted in writing. Dr. Talmage laid stress on the independent writings of the evangelists, and pointed out that the unique story as to sequence of events disproved conclusion amongst the separate writers of the four Gospels. Moreover, the purpose of the author in each case was to write up a diary or journal. Let not an insignificant omission by one writer, or an incident recorded by another, hide the great truth declared by both. Introducing the special topic of the day the lecturer reminded his hearers that we have here to deal with incidents occurring in the course of the second missionary tour of Paul and Silas, on which journey Jesus was accompanied by the Twelve, and by a company of devout disciples, amongst whom were certain women who had been healed by the power of the Christ. Here we find first mention of Mary Magdalene. Multitudes gathered about this devoted band, obstructing the way and retarding progress.

At Capernaum, "His own city," the crowd thronged about the Teacher, and some of His kinsmen sought to restrain Him by force, declaring "He is beside Himself." When His relatives failed to reach Him because of the throng, and managed to get word through the crowd that He was in the city, He proclaimed His divine relationship with the Father as being above all bonds of earthly kinship, by saying, "I have said, 'Behold, by mother and my brethren.'"

As He made His way to the boat to cross the lake called sea, three candidates for recognition among the disciples appeared; one a scribe, rank two others who begged a delay before they actually joined Him; these were rejected. As the company put many smaller boats followed; but these probably returned at the signs of a gathering storm. The night voyage was tempestuous in the extreme, yet the devoted Jesus quietly slept. At last the fear-stricken disciples awakened Him, with the entreaty, "Carest thou not that we perish?"

Then, gently chiding the lack of faith that made the fearful wail, with sublime simplicity He spoke "Peace, be still!"
