House Committee on Naval Affairs Turns Down the Program of the President.

HE WANTED FOUR WARSHIPS.

Those to be Built to be of Delaware Class and to Cost \$9,500,000 Each

Washington, Feb. 10 .- By a vote of 13 to 5, one member absent and not voting, the house committee on naval affairs today rejected the president's urgent recommendation that Congress at this session authorize the building of four battleships at a total cost of \$38,-000,000; and by a unanimous vote thera was included in the navy appropriation bill an authorization for the construction of two, to cost \$9,500,000, each to be of the Delaware type.

These representatives voted in accordance with the president's recomcordance with the president's recom-mendations: Lilley of Connecticut, (Republican); Thomas, Ohio, (Repub-lican); Myer, Louisiana, (Democrat); Talbott, Maryland, (Democrat), and Hobson, Alabama, (Democrat), and Hobson, Alabama, (Democrat). Representative Hobson announced af-ter the committee meeting that he in-tended to make a minority report re-commending authorization for four bat-disables

ticships. The preference of the committee stood

The preference of the committee stood in favor of a four-battleship authoriza-tion, but the voting attitude of the anajority was expressed by Chairman Foss when he said: "Experience has shown that it is more profitable in the end to recom-mend in the beginning what you know the house will stand for. A recom-mendation for four battleships could not be put through at this session." The naval appropriation bill as amended and agreed upon by the com-mittee, carries a total appropriation of \$i01,000,000 for the navy establishment for the next fiscal year, about \$24,000,-000 less than was asked for in the de-partment estimates. Under the head of new authorizations for whose fulfilment Congress is bound to appropriate money at the next ses-sion if the bill as recommended passes the house and senate, the committee included two battleships to cost \$19,-000,000; 10 destroyers, \$8,500,000; eight submarine torpedo boats, \$3,040,000; to-tal, \$30,540,000, or \$38,730,000 less than the total for new authorizations asked for the naw denattment for the navy department.

The new authorization estimates re-sted by the committee comprised the flowing: Two battleships, \$19,000,000; llowing: four scout cruisers, \$10,000,000; one am-munition ship, \$1,750,000; one repuir ship, \$2,000,000; two mine-laying ships (cruisers to be converted), \$500,000.

TO PROHIBIT SMOKING.

Bill in Commons for Protection of Minors Under Sixteen.

London, Feb. 10.—A bill which passed its first reading in the house of com-mons this afternoon prohibits smoking under the age of 16. Among other interesting features, the bill establishes juvenile courts through-out the country, and calls for special places of detention for children, in-stead of sending them to the ordinary prisons. It proposes furthermore that the imprisonment of children be en-tirely abolished. tirely abolished.

tirely abolished. An effort is to be made also to end the terrible waste of infant life through drunken parents rolling on their ba-bles in bed. The returns show that 1,600 infants perish annually from this cause, and in the future parents will be punished for such deaths. Burn-ings are responsible for almost an equal number of infant deaths, and penalties are provided for persons who leave children alone in rooms with un-garded fires.

the retired list. There is a less per-centage ashore than there has been for 10 years.
