

AUTHORIZE TWO NEW BATTLESHIPS

House Committee on Naval Affairs Turns Down the Program of the President.

HE WANTED FOUR WARSHIPS.

Those to be Built to Cost \$9,500,000 Each.

Washington, Feb. 10.—By a vote of 13 to 1, one member absent and not voting, the house committee on naval affairs today rejected the president's recommendation that Congress at this session authorize the building of four battleships at a total cost of \$38,000,000, and by a unanimous vote there was included in the navy appropriation bill an authorization for the construction of two, to cost \$9,500,000, each to be of the Delaware type.

These representatives voted in accordance with the president's recommendation: Lilley, of Connecticut, (Republican); Thomas, Ohio, (Republican); Meyer, Louisiana, (Democrat); Talbot, Maryland, (Democrat); and Hobson, Alabama, (Democrat). Representative Hobson announced after the committee meeting that he intended to make a minority report recommending authorization for four battleships.

In favor of a four-battleship authorization, but the voting attitude of the majority was expressed by Chairman Foss when he said:

"Experience has shown that it is more profitable in the end to recommend in the beginning what you know the house will stand for. A recommendation for four battleships could not be put through this session."

The new authorization estimates recommended by the committee comprised the following: Two battleships, \$19,000,000; four scout cruisers, \$10,000,000; one ammunition ship, \$1,750,000; one repair ship, \$2,000,000; two mine-laying ships (cruisers to be converted), \$500,000.

The committee, however, raised from four to eight the number of submarine torpedo boats, \$2,040,000; to 10, \$3,540,000; or \$5,580,000 less than the total for new authorizations asked for the navy department.

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These boats, by the adoption of an amendment offered by Representative Loudenslager of New Jersey, are to be of the Octopus type in accordance with the report of the Marix board, before whom last year's tests off Newport were made. FOUND GOLD. Men on Nevada Desert Were Seeking Shelter from Storm.

Reno, Nev., Feb. 10.—A special dispatch from Hazen, Nev., to the Journal tonight says:

ON THE TRACK OF A GREAT MURDER MYSTERY

Oakland, Cal., Feb. 10.—The discovery of another skeleton late this afternoon in the same excavation in which a workman on the premises of Eglol Paganucci in Elmhurst dug up a skeleton last Saturday afternoon, leads the coroner's office of Alameda county to believe that they are on the track of a big murder mystery. The bones found today were in the same state of preservation as the others. They were located in the same hole about two feet deep.

Sheriff Barnett has ordered his deputies to make a thorough investigation. The bones found on Saturday have been examined by surgeons at the request of the coroner's office and pronounced as bones of a human being and not enough decomposed to bear the theory that they were those of some ancient Indian as was first supposed.

The man who was digging the well when the first skeleton was unearthed refused to give the date or location of his job of digging a well. He had excavated probably two feet when his pick struck something hard which when uncovered was found to be a skull.

Notice was given the sheriff and the coroner's office and deputies from each were sent to the place. Tomorrow a general search will be made of the premises.

TO PROHIBIT SMOKING. Bill in Commons for Protection of Minors Under Sixteen.

London, Feb. 10.—A bill which passed its first reading in the house of commons this afternoon prohibits smoking under the age of 16.

Among other interesting features, the bill establishes juvenile courts throughout the country, and calls for special places of detention for children, instead of sending them to the ordinary prisons. It proposes furthermore that the imprisonment of children be entirely abolished.

An effort is to be made also to end the terrible waste of infant life through drunken parents rolling on their babies in bed. The returns show that 1,600 infants perish annually from this cause, and in the future parents will be punished for such deaths. Burnings are responsible for almost an equal number of infant deaths, and the guards are provided for persons who leave children alone in rooms with unguarded fires.

BROOKLYN BANK REOPENED. New York, Feb. 10.—The First National bank of Brooklyn, which closed on Oct. 25 last, reopened for business today. A deficiency of \$185,000 has been made good by the stockholders.

KING CARLOS AND CROWN PRINCE LIE SIDE BY SIDE.

Lisbon, Feb. 10.—The bodies of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz Philippe were today laid away beside those of their royal ancestors in the sacred sepulchre of the Pantheon. The official closing of one of the most tragical incidents in Portuguese history was attended by a scene which almost developed into a disaster. A great crowd numbering into thousands struggled outside the cathedral of San Vincente seeking to enter and view the bodies before the doors were finally closed for the ceremony. Brushing back the police and the guard of royal archers, they poured into the church, sweeping everything before them. A panic was threatened and the cavalry was called out to disperse the pushing thousands. Women and children were caught in the crush and many of them were bruised and trampled upon, but no fatalities have been reported.

When the doors eventually were closed to the throngs of curious onlookers, the ceremony of entombment was begun. All the ministers of state were present. The patriarch of Lisbon, wearing pontifical vestments and assisted by other high

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BEECH HARGIS. Defense for Killing His Father May be Insanity.

Jackson, Ky., Feb. 10.—The circuit courtroom was crowded today when Beech Hargis, charged with the murder of his father, Judge J. H. Hargis, was brought before Judge Taubee for examination. He showed no signs of a breakdown. Judge Redwine for the defendant asked leave to give bail, but the court not allowed. He believed that the defense will be insanity, although the young man still insists that he killed his father in self-defense.

TOM FEENEY CAPTURED. Wanted on Two Charges of Murder And Two of Burglary.

Auburn, Cal., Feb. 10.—Sheriff Henry Walker of Nevada county and Sheriff George McAulay of this county today captured Tom Feeney, a man wanted in Nevada county on two charges of murder and two of burglary. Feeney admitted the burglaries to the officers, but denied the murders. He was captured at the Gateway ranch, a few miles from Auburn, where he had stopped for something to eat. The murders, which he is charged took place at Deadman's flat and Kentucky ridge, near Grass valley, in December. The charred body of a Chinese miner was discovered in the smoldering ruins of his cabin about the same time the dead body of William Bowen, another miner, was found a short distance away. He had been shot to death. A short time afterward, some one fired a shot at Mark B. Steyer, through the window of his cabin. Sheriff Walker received information which led him to believe Feeney committed the murders, and took him back to Grass valley on the local train this evening.

NAVAL OFFICERS. Metcalf's Report Showing Number Afloat and Ashore.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Responding to a request by the president, Secy. Metcalf today sent to the senate a statement showing the number of officers of the navy ashore and afloat. The purpose of the statement is to refute the charges that have been made to the senate committee on naval affairs, that nearly one-half of the officers have been enlisted by "social pull," and are enjoying "soft berths" in Washington and at the various navy yards. Figures are given for July 1, 1905, and Jan. 1, 1906. In 1905 the line officers of the navy numbered 1,109 and staff officers 543, or a total of 1,652. Of this number there were 749 line officers and 283 staff officers afloat, or a total of 1,032. In 1906 the line officers numbered 1,279 and the staff officers 638, a total of 1,917. Of this number 914 line officers and 234 staff officers, or a total of 1,148 officers, are afloat. The percentage of the line officers of the active list, and three officers of the active list, and three of the retired list. There is a less percentage ashore than there has been for 10 years.

RUEF'S COUNSEL BRISTLES WITH TECHNICALITIES. Never Used Power of His Office in His Own Behalf.

Marseilles, Feb. 10.—When Senator Franco and his family arrived here tonight a big crowd had assembled at the railway station. The former premier and his party were flanked by police and hurriedly entered the Terminus hotel, going at once to their apartments. Senator Franco reiterated in an interview that he believed he had done his duty as a Portuguese.

"I never used power for my own personal welfare," he said, "but always for the good of my unfortunate sovereign and country."

He would not disclose his ultimate destination, but it is generally believed here that he is going to Italy.

DEPEW TO CULBERSON. Replies to Charge That New York Banks Were Favored in Panic.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Senator Depew today replied to a recent charge made in the senate by Senator Culberson of Texas that during the recent panic the secretary of the treasury favored New York City in depositing public money in national depositories.

The danger that was so great, he said, was avoided by the wise action of the secretary of the treasury, assisted by that phenomenal genius, Pierpont Morgan, who, associating himself with the bankers of New York, provided the means by which the banks could be saved.

At the time of this utterance, Mr. Morgan occupied a seat in the private gallery of senators, and was a careful listener to all that was said.
