# HITCHCOCK'S TRIAL BEGINS IN NEW YORK

An official of the foreign office pointed out today that Great Britain could not interfere in this matter. New York, March 10,-Raymond Hitchcock, the comedian, was put on trial in the criminal branch of the supreme court before Justice Blanchard supreme court before Justice Blanchard on an indictment growing out of charges preforred by a 15-year-old girl. The case had been assigned for trial several weeks ago, but there had been several postponements for various causes upon motion of the defense. An effort to have still another adjourn-ment was made today by Hitchcock's counsel, but Justice Blanchard over-ruled the motion and directed that the selection of a jury be commenced with-out delay.

## \$0000000000000000000000000000 FIRE IN ALMSHOUSE: INMATES ALL SAVED

San Francisco, March 10 .-- One of the buildings of the city and county almshouse was burned this morning. In it when the fire broke out were 200 persons, mostly patients removed from the city and county hospital, So far as known all were removed in safety, though five are raported to have been injured.

The almshouse is located some distance from the center of the city and is near the Lake Honda reservoir of the Spring Valley Water company.

The fire broke out on the second floor at 9 o'clock this morning, and is supposed to have been caused by a defective fuse. It quickly spread to the roof and the whole building was soon a mass of flames. Good work was done in removing the inmates to places of safety. Their number is now placed at 141 and it is old that all have been accounted for. All of the available fire engines and ambulances were at once rushed to the scene and rendered effective service.
