FAMOUS PITCHER DEAD.

Manufacturing Interests Suffered James Galvin Passes Away After Four Months Illness.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 7 .- James Galvin, a once famous basebal pitcher, is dead at his home in Allegheny, after an illness of four months of catarrh of the stomach. He was 48 years old. James Galvin was one of the most famous characters in the history of baseball. For years he was one of the cading pitchers in the National league nd perhaps had as many friends . the time of his death as any single inlividual who has followed the game as profetsion,

His last hours were made as comfortable as possible by the many friends who constantly surrounded his bedside. As is the case with many o the public's idols in sporting life Calvin was not well supplied with money at the time of his death. Realizing this, a number of his friends start-ed a fund last week and soon raised a sum of money, which was turned over to the then sick man's family. Among the many telegrams received by Galvin ore death from sympathizing friends were the following from well known baseball fans:
