Passes to Be Trimmed.

Commercial Freight Agent M. J. Allen of the Baltimore & Ohio in Denver, was in town today looking after the interests of his road. He says railroad men in Denver expect that the pass system will be materially restricted the coming year; that a large and interesting aggregation of traveling freight and passenger agents will ing treight and passenger agents will be permanently severed from their an-nual receipt of free transportation. The result will be an extended pruning of this class of agencies if not a practical abolition of this particular branch of railroad work. Mr. Allen says that one particular reason for this belief is that the eastern passenger mon base that the eastern passenger men have not sent out this winter as usual their requests for western transportation, and there is no intimation whatever that any eastern transnortation will be sent west. While the action recently of the eastern passenger association in formally swearing off on issuing passes loes not bind the operating departments or the managers of the roads opresented by these passenger agents, still, Mr. Allen thinks the action of the latter will be largely influential in bringing about a similar condition of things in other departments which issue passes also.

Heavy Locomot've Orders.

The ordering of locomotives continues to be the special order of the day in the mechanical departments of American roads, and the growth of traffic is such that there is no telling when the de-mand will subside. The following roads have in the past week been ordering as follows, Norfolk & Western ten engines from the American Locomotive comfrom the American Locomotive com-pany: Lehigh Valley, ten engines from the Baldwin works; C. B. & Q., twenty-five freight engines of the prairie type from the Baldwins; St. Clair Steel com-pany, four six wheeled engine from the American company: Santa Fe road, 420 engines from the Baldwins; Lake Shore & Michigan southern, twenty-five Michigan southern, twenty-five switching engines; Pennsylvania Railroad, 200 engines from the Baldwins; New York Central twenty engines from Scheneetady works and fifteen

from the Cooke works; Detroit & Mackinac road, two ten wheel engines; a total of 431 engines. At this rate, it is safe to say that the total shops of this country are turning out locomotives at the rate of 6,000 per year.
