### CITY COUNCIL.

Only eight members of the City Council were present at the session of July 8th. Mayor Scott presided, and a disposition was shown to get through with the business on the table without unnecessary delay. The quantity of business demanding attention was smaller than usual.

Dallas & Hedges were given permission to pile building material on Fifth East Street between First and Second South.

John Smith reported that on account of the unskillful and careless manner in which the steam street roller had been manipulated, it had caused his team to run away, resulting in injury to his horses, and bruises and sprains to his own per-

son; and he asked to be paid damages, but named no amount. His communication was referred to the committee on claims.

The Young Ladies Aid Society asked leave to establish refreshment stands in Liberty Park, free of license, promising to devote the profits to charitable purposes. Granted.

R. H. Cabell and others represented that they owned a tract of land near the headwaters of City Creek, which was suitable for reservoir sites, and which they were willing to sell to the city. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

Johnson & Hodgson were granted permission to pile building material in the street at 54 and 56 south West Temple Street.

A number of residents of West Temple Street united in a petition that the Council grant a franchise on that street to the Salt Lake City Railway Company. Referred to the committee on streets.

Clark, Eldredge & Co. and John Morgan asked that a water main be laid on First South Street between West Temple and First West streets. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

The Utah Central Railroad Company asked for an extension of time in which to lay its track on Fourth West Street. Referred to the committee on streets.

The recorder reported that the protests against laying the water mains on Fifth East Street were not sufficient and the work was ordered to be done.

The city engineer presented a detailed report of work done and pending in his department, which was referred to the committee on improvements. The report was accompanied by a bundle of vouchers.

The same officer submitted profiles showing grade lines on certain streets, which were referred to the committee on streets.

The collector of water rates reported that the amounts collected during the fiscal year ending June 30th were: by his predecessor, \$11,598,45; by himself, \$12,266,65; total \$23,865,10. Uncollectible, \$123,40.

W. H. Ryan, superintendent of the waterworks, asked for an appropriation of \$10,000 to pay for hydrants, valves, pipe, etc. Granted.

E. R. Clute, city assessor and collector, reported that he had been unable to complete the assessment roll, and asked an extension of time until the first Tuesday in August. Granted.

The city engineer reported in favor of accepting the plot of Fairfield addition. Adopted.

W. A. Stanton, chief of the fire department, presented the following:
