OUTWARD MOVEMENT OF GOLD.

The situation in financial circles begins to assume an alarming character. The outflow of gold from the United States is unprecedented, and under present conditions rather anomalous. Since the first of January of the present year something like \$41,000,000 in gold has left this country. During this same period in 1890 we had a net inward movement of gold of about \$1,000,000. This change is too revolutionary to escape notice. From \$1,000,000 inwards to \$41,000,000 outwards in one year is something that ought necessarily to cause alarm.
