The change was made by Second Asst. Postmaster Gen. McCleary at Washington after considering four bids to take care of this part of the postal service.

New York, April 10.—Colin Armstrong editor of the Wall Street Summary, lectured before the New York chapter of the American Institute of Banking last night on "The Relation of Speculation to Business." In concluding, Mr. Armstrong took up the movement toward restrictive legislation, He said that the way to stop stock gambling was to put it under the same regulation that applies to all other forms of gambling.

"The trouble is not with our established markets and exchanges," he said.
"They protect business as well as pro-

vide facilities for its transaction. It is the very facilities that they afford and that are so largely abused that are seemingly responsible for the present

seemingly responsible for the present criticism and tirades against them.

"Now, as we cannot legislate the exchanges out of existence, unless we want to drive business out of the country, and as all efforts to legislate human nature up to a higher level have

proved distinct tailures, we have got
to make speculative transactions that
are known to be of gambling intent unpopular, unprofitable and indefensible.
"This cannot be done by law, but it
