LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The Pyramids.—Mr. C. W. Stayer lectures on the "Pyramids of Power," Tuesday evening, in the 5th Ward meeting-house, at 7.30.

Making a Tour.—The Utah State conference closed yesterday afternoon. President Taylor and party, however, will not return directly, but make a short tour of the other settlements of that county, previous to coming home.

Party Series.—A series of seven dancing parties, commencing this evening, Dec. 1, and continuing each alternate Monday night, will be held in the Eleventh Ward Assembly Rooms, during the season. Olsen's band, Currie prompter, series tickets \$3, and select companies are among the inducements offered.

"Enquirer" Items.—Diphtheria still reigns in the land.
Mr. A. A. Noon, of Provo, is extracting a superior article of graphite, or black lead, from his mine in the Tintic range west of Goeben.

Professor K. G. Masser lectured Saturday evening, before the joint session of the Improvement Associations, on the "Personal Characteristics of our Savior."

An Ear Ticker.—The Beaver Watchman of the 26th ult., says: "Judge Boreman returned from Salt Lake City a week ago, and appears very much at home among his old friends. We are glad to see His Honor back, ready to dispense justice, which he has always done in this district."

Pleased to hear that "His Honor" has dispensed justice in some corner of the earth.

Now's the Time.—To-morrow evening, Professor Careless opens his singing class, for the instruction of students in musical theory and sight reading. This is a good opportunity for those who are pursuing the study of the "divine art" to acquire a knowledge of its occult and beautiful mysteries. Choir leaders experience considerable difficulty in the exercise of their vocations, from the scarcity of music readers among their followers, a difficulty which would entirely disappear and many other advantages be made manifest, if singers would seize such opportunities for cultivating their gifts, as is presented by a course of training under Professor Careless. It would repay a Ward to send one or two of its choir members to this class for instruction.

A Precious Pair Captured.—About five o'clock last evening City Marshal Brown arrested Chas. Morris and wife, the notorious couple who "eloped" from Salt Lake recently, and who are charged with brutally ill-treating a child. The warrant for the arrest of the perpetrators of the cruelty had been in the hands of Deputy Marshal Young for about three weeks, during which time the couple was seen frequently on the streets but was not arrested. Finally Marshal Schaughnessy sent Mr. Giesner up, and the latter gentlemen secured possession of the warrant, and enlisted the services of Marshal Brown, and thus brought about the capture of the game without delay or trouble. Saturday night, both offenders were brought to Salt Lake and will be bestowed in the Penitentiary to await further process of the law.

Police Court.—W. Stahl, saloon keeper, arrested several days ago on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday, Nov. 2, was tried this afternoon by jury, and discharged for want of evidence.

Kate Flint, charged with selling beer yesterday (Sunday), pleaded guilty, and was fined \$50.

The case of Robert Halsup and William Wardell, for fighting, is set for to-morrow at 2 p. m.

A civil case, Williams vs. Barnes, is going on this afternoon.

Educational Meeting.—The matter of revising the school law occupied the whole of the time of the educational meeting on Saturday evening, two or three other sections of the committee's report being discussed and adopted by the meeting. It then adjourned until next Saturday night. During the consideration of the proposed reforms, the meetings of the Association will be held weekly.

The Scrip Matter in Court.—Z. C. M. I. has instituted proceedings, in the District Court, against O. J. Hollister, United States Internal revenue collector, for the recovery of the special tax of 10 per cent. on the circulating scrip of that institution, assessed by the Internal Revenue Commissioner, July 25th, 1878, and paid, under protest, and with notice for a future suit for its recovery, by the plaintiff, on the 25th of last September. The amounts in question, aggregate about \$9,500.

Second District Court.—The District Court convenes in Beaver next Monday, (Dec. 1) but there will be no jury. We are informed by Mr. J. R. Wilkins, the clerk, that the grand jury was discharged on account of there being no business before them—at least none that was known of. The jury cases which it was designed to try at this term, have by consent of counsel been continued.—Beaver Watchman.

The Best Road.—Brother J. C. Anderson, of Kosharene, Platte County, furnishes the following information, for the benefit of emigrants to Colorado. By taking the route here described, travelers will find it much to their advantage, it being a shorter way, but better supplied with grass and water than all the other routes:

Follow the county road from Salina south through King's Meadow Cañon, 10 miles; thence due south through Bear Valley, past Burville to Kosharene, 15 miles; thence south to Greenwich, 3 miles; continue south 3 miles to Beaver Creek, 15 miles; further south to Coyote Creek, 20 miles; cross Coyote Creek and go east 4 miles and south 3, to Seven Mile Creek; thence southwest 5 miles, to Rider's Ranch, and 8 miles southeast to intersect the Panguitch and Potosi Valley road, near the mouth of the cañon; go through said cañon across the divide to the settlement, distance 14 miles. The distance from Salina through Grass Valley, to the settlement in Potato Valley, is 100 miles.
