TERRITORIAL ITEMS.
 CULLED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.
 —Fred E. Van Meeterbeek, the transcontinental bicyclist, reached Tucson, Arizona, on the 4th inst., being 95 days from New York. He came via New Orleans, and left on August 4th for San Francisco, via Los Angeles. He was in good trim, and expects to reach San Francisco on the 10th inst. He has a pretty tough time wheeling over the desert belt.

 A short time ago two men who were out of work and had very little cash, started out to try their luck at mining on Warm Springs Creek, Montana. Neither had done any mining, but stopped at a mine long enough to learn the difference between good ore and waste. They searched in vain and finally became discouraged. They were about leaving a clump of trees where they had got down to rest, one of them struck his pick in the ground, and to his great surprise turned over a small quantity of richly-colored ore. Further investigation showed that the mine was a valuable discovery. Two claims were located—the Silver Chain and Antelope—and in one, at a depth of six feet the lode is three feet wide, and assays 500 ounces silver and 20 per cent. copper. The discoverers, under the firm name of T. H. Gould & Co., are working their claims, for which they have received \$10,000.
 An artesian well flowing 30,000 gallons an hour has just been struck in Fresno county, California.

CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met in regular session at 7 o'clock last evening, Mayor Armstrong presiding.

C. C. Foster and a number of residents of the Sixth and Fifteenth Wards, called on Mayor Armstrong to the Council to discuss the condition of Third South Street between the D. & R. G. depot and the Black Bridge. During the last winter the street is nearly impassable for teams, and a source of great annoyance to all who pass that way. They respectfully requested that the Council should remedy the evil complained of by taking before winter sets in.

The Council was granted, and the Street Supervisor instructed to attend to the matter in the regular order. W. M. Shearer and 40 others, residents of Arson Hill, represented that they had repeatedly petitioned previous City Councils with a view to obtaining a proper supply of water, and had invariably met with the reply that the water and sewerage should be attended to at the same time that the similar condition of the dry benches was remedied. They thought their time had come now, and asked relief. They also incidentally called the attention of the Council to the "barren, yawning gravel pit at the head of Main Street," and suggested that the matter be at once remedied. 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CANVASSING THE RETURNS.
 The "LIBERALS" PROTEST AND EX-DENY TO STEAL BEAVER COUNTY.

The Board of Canvassers appointed to canvass the returns of the general election of August 2nd met in the rooms of the Utah Commission in this city to-day. There were present all of the members—Messrs. A. L. Thomas, W. W. Foster, W. C. A. Bryan, M. B. Sowles, and T. H. Hayt.

The canvassing of the votes was then commenced, Beaver County being first in order. When Beaver County precinct was reached, the chairman presented the following:
