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IMPROVEMENTS TO COST \$100,000

Outlined by the City Council to Include Street and Side-walk Paving.

INFANT DROWNED IN CANAL.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Mullen Heartbroken Over Loss—Automobile Club Organized—Marriage Licenses.

OGDEN, May 25.—Six more blocks of paved streets, more than 12,000 lineal feet of sidewalks and improvements in the city parks, costing approximately \$100,000 is what was outlined by the city council at its session last night, all of which is to be done within the next six months.

The public building and grounds committee recommended that \$2,500 be appropriated to the board of park commissioners for the completion of the improvements in the city parks. The recommendation was adopted.

City Engineer Parker reported that the city had gained jurisdiction for the paving of the following districts: Twenty-fourth street between Grant and Wall avenues; Lincoln avenue between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets; Wall avenue between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets and Washington avenue between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets. He recommended that the engineering department be authorized to prepare plans and estimates for the work which will cost about \$57,000.

The city council appropriated \$375 to pay the expenses of an expert who will go to California to make tests of asphalt so that the city will be guarded against contracting for inferior paving material. The city engineer also reported that in the matter of creating sidewalk district comprising South Washington avenue, Pincock Lane, Porter avenue and South Grant avenue, jurisdiction had been acquired by the city and recommended that estimates be prepared and bids be advertised for. The work calls for 12,177 lineal feet of cement sidewalk. The report was adopted.

In a communication to the council Governor William Spry asked that an appropriation be made for the G. A. R. encampment to be held in Salt Lake City next August. He stated that the recent legislature had delegated to the city councils of the various towns of the state authority to make such appropriations.

The communication was referred to the finance committee.

J. S. Lewis on behalf of the Civic Improvement league asked permission of the council to create a paving district on Twenty-fourth street between Washington avenue and Adams avenue without cost to the city except its maintenance. After some debate the matter was tabled for one week on motion of Councilman Thorne to allow the members of the league to appear before the council and explain verbally their proposition.

An ordinance introduced by Councilman Flygare providing for the collection and disposition of poll taxes and outlining the duties of the poll tax collector was passed to its second reading by title and referred to the law committee and city attorney.

found in a canal which runs near the family residence, 3250 Jefferson avenue, last night shortly after 7 o'clock.
