

## INTEREST GROWS IN ENCAMPMENT

President Taft and Other Notables Receive Engraved Invitations.

COLORADO IS ALSO IN LINE.

Hearty Support May Be Expected From Neighboring State—Ogden And Weber Giving Aid.

President Taft and other prominent men all over the country will receive handily engraved invitations to attend the forty-third session of the U. A. R. encampment, to be held in Salt Lake City, Aug. 9 to 14. The invitations have been sent to members of the president's cabinet, department officials, governors of states, department and past department commanders of the G. A. R., officers of the Women's Relief Corps, and other prominent people. The invitations are of heroic size, containing at the head of the document the conventional American eagle, ready for flight and holding the stars and stripes. The seal of the State of Utah appears just under the eagle in a handsome scroll, while below the whole is a monogram of the letters "G. A. R." At the sides of the insignia are the national colors. The invitation reads as follows: "The city of Salt Lake and the State of Utah cordially invite you to be present at the forty-third annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held during the week of Aug. 9 to 14, 1909, at Salt Lake City."

The invitation is accompanied by a card bearing the official insignia of the G. A. R. and requests that replies to the invitation be sent to Hiram E. Booth, chairman of the invitation committee.

Dr. A. S. Condon of Ogden, was a recent visitor at G. A. R. headquarters at the Commercial club building. Dr. Condon said the county commissioners of Weber county had appropriated \$1,000 and a like amount had been raised in Ogden to defray the expenses of the delegates and visitors to the encampment.

COLORADO ENTHUSIASTIC.

The Pueblo, Colo., Star-Journal reflects the sentiment of the people of the Centennial state with regard to the coming encampment in the following article recently appearing in its columns:

"Colorado should give hearty support to the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, that is to be held in August at Salt Lake City. This entire section of the country should labor earnestly for the success of any great national gathering held within its confines and not Salt Lake City, but all of the Rocky mountain region has been honored by the selection of our neighbor city by the veterans."

"Colorado being the largest in point of population of any of the states directly bordering upon Utah, and certainly send the banner delegation to the encampment, especially since the expense of attendance is less for this state than for any other."

"The railroads have done their best to promote the success of the gathering, and especially in Colorado, the Denver & Rio Grande, which is the official route, has made well nigh perfect arrangements for the transportation of the veterans and others who wish to visit the encampment."

"It will be to this state's everlasting disgrace if it fails to take advantage of these opportunities and extend the proper courtesy to its sister and neighbor state and respect to the veterans of the great civil struggle, and it is believed that no such stigma will attach to Colorado but that the Centennial state will rise to its opportunities and demonstrate that it is rightly regarded as the leading commonwealth of the Rocky mountain section."

**WARNS ALFALFA GROWERS.**

Prof. E. G. Titus Gives Method of Exterminating Lucern Pests.

Prof. E. G. Titus, state entomologist, has issued from the Agricultural college the following circular for the benefit of alfalfa raisers, whether their crop is infected by weevil or not:

The alfalfa leaf-weevil, an introduced European insect, is now causing great damage to lucern in Salt Lake county. The insect appears rapidly in the weevil or adult stage, but causes the most injury when in the younger stages by feeding on the leaves, buds and flowers.

Eggs are laid on alfalfa in April and May, the larvae or worms becoming full grown in the latter part of June and throughout July, spinning a lace-like cocoon, from which later issues the small brown hard-shelled weevil. This weevil hibernates through the winter in any sheltered place, ditch banks, stacks, alfalfa plants, weeds, etc.

The first crop should be cut as early as possible. The ground disced and cross-disced as soon as the hay is off, and then gone over with a leveler in the same way. These operations will kill a large percentage of the young worms. Then force the second crop as rapidly as possible and repeat the disking and leveling.

Clean up all ditch banks, fence rows, old stack grounds and rubbish early in the fall by burning. Ship no hay out of infected region.

So far the trouble is confined to Salt Lake county; but there is danger of its spreading. Specimens of alfalfa affected by the pest are on exhibition at the Chamber of Commerce in this city.
