A correspondent writes to inform us that the readiest and most useful remedy for scalds and burns is an embrocation of lime and water and linseed oil. These simple agents combined, form a thick, cream-like substance, which effectually excludes the air from the injured parts, and allays the inflammation almost instantly. He mentions a case where a child fell backward into a bath tub of boiling water, and was nearly flayed from her neck below her hips. Her agonies were indescribable; but her clothing being gently removed, and the lime and oil preparation thickly spread over the injured surface, she was sound asleep in five minutes. Subsequently the parts were carefully washed with warm milk and water three times a day, the oil dressing renewed, and the little patient rapidly recovered. Though all the scalded skin came off, she did not have a scar. This remedy leaves no hard coat to dry on the sores, but softens the parts, and aids nature to repair the injury in the readiest and most expeditious manner. The mixture may be procured in the drug store; but if not thus accessible, slake a lump of quicklime in water, as soon as the water is urgent, use boiling water over the lime, and it will become clear in five minutes: The preparation may be kept ready bottled in the house, and it will be as good when six months old as when first made.—New York Sun.

The British markets are being supplied with a new article of food, kangaroo tail. It is imported in tin cans, like Australian mutton, and is called kangaroo venison. Those who have tried it give a favorable report of its qualities, and it bids fair to become popular. An English journal says that those who are vegetarian because they object to the destruction of animal life, can eat this meat without scruple, as the tails of kangaroos are so large that they must be an inconvenience to their owners, while, by placing the animal under the influence of chloroform, their tails can be painlessly amputated and packed in tins before they are aware of the operation.
