Whereas, the chief of police is reported in the public press as having stated to a committee of citizens that he would not enforce the law relative to the clos-ing of saloons on Sunday, and Whereas, chapter 10, section 245 of the

revised statutes of Utah makes it the duty of the chief of police to enforce all laws and ordinances, Therefore, be it resolved that the chief of police, the Mayor and the City

Council be and are hereby instructed immediately enforce said law.
