Salt Lake for a time. In 1864 she went again to Provo to live with her sons. In 1870 she, in company with her sons, moved to Marsh Valley, where she lived till the time of her death.

She leaves two sons, one daughter and eighteen grand children, who in common with the Saints of this Ward, will feel deeply the bereavement. Sister Jenkins was First Counselor to the President of the Relief Society. She was ever found true to her covenants and died in full faith of a glorious resurrection beyond the grave.—Com.

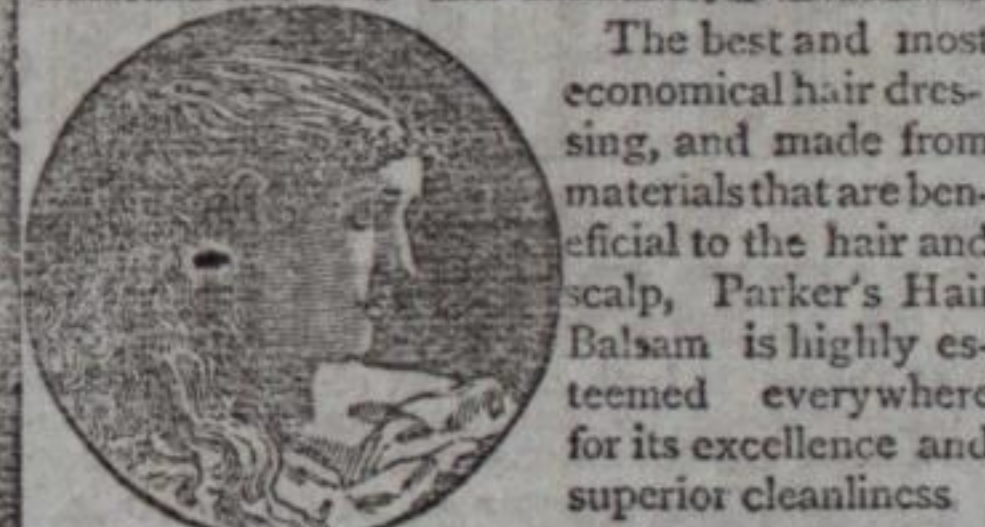

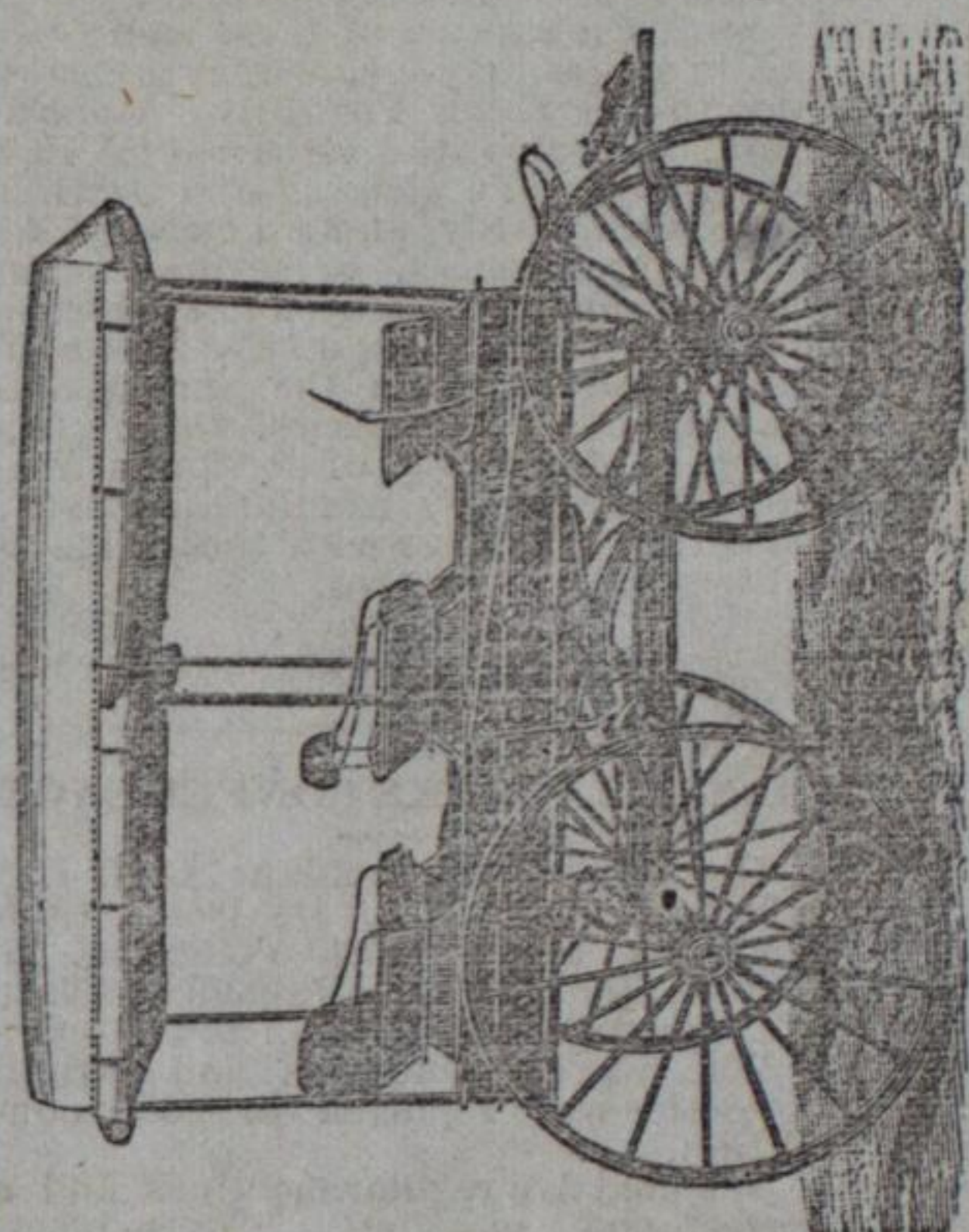
