The question of how the Holy Ghost is to be received, was entered into elaborately. Many passages of the Bi-ble were quoted setting forth the doc-trine of the laying on of hands for the reception of the Holy Ghost. It was declared that that ordinance was one of the most important of the saving ordinances of the Gospel, and yet had been dispensed with by the world and is now only heard of among the Latterday Saints.

Elder Clawson dwelt briefly upon the subject of obedience to divine author. The Saints were admonished to e faithful and to study the works of the Church. While the Lord requires the Saints to speak through the power of the Holy Grost He also requires them to fill their minds with truth that the Spirit may draw upon them when ccasion demanded.
