The demand for these lots is not as great, however, as would have been the case however, as would have been the case had the sale taken place at an earlier date, as the greater number of those who filed on farms, many of whom would have bought lots, have left the would have bought lots, have left the country. Major O'Brien of Denver, who was selected to auction the lots, is here, ready for tomorrow. It is stated that the commissioners who ap-

praised the value of the lots, fixed the prices at from \$16 to \$50. Reports from up the Duchesne indi-cate that Dora, the new town at the junction of the Duchesne and Strawjunction of the Duchesne and Straw-berry rivers, is growing right along. There are many who believe that it will be the best town on the reserva-tion. Should the reports of mineral discoveries in Whiterocks canyon prove true and the mines there develop into dividend payers, which seems probable, there will be a boom town somewhere along the Unitah river, as the three townships, that w<sup>41</sup> depend on that stream for water, have more ir-rigable land than any other portion of the reservation, which added to the the reservation, which added to the mines will give it a big lead.
