CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Washington, Dec. 13.—A telegram was received at the war department on Sunday, dated Austin, Texas, from General Reynolds, announcing, officially, the almost unanimous adoption of the Texas Constitution, and the election of Davis, as Governor.

HOUSE.

Memorial Presented—More Discussion of the Virginia Question.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Wood presented a joint resolution from the New York legislature, withdrawing the assent heretofore given, ratifying the 15th Amendment, and the House thereupon took up and resumed the consideration of the bill to admit Virginia to representation in Congress.

ILLINOIS.

Virginia Republicans memorialize Congress, the Subject Discussed.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—The session of the Senate yesterday was devoted to a debate on the Virginia bill. Sumner introduced a memorial from certain Republicans in Virginia now in Washington, containing a statement of affairs in that State. The memorial declares that the majority of the Virginia legislature were elected by fraud, violence and intimidation, and that the rights of secession are believed in now as formerly as before the war; that the pledge of the Walker party to carry out the new constitution was given to deceive Congress and gain admission. It is also claimed that Governor Walker was a Copperhead during the war and in full sympathy with the rebellion; that he was President of a Club in Chicago, organized to rescue rebel prisoners from Camp Douglas, and that his proclivities have undergone no change.

TENNESSEE.

Constitutional Convention.

NASHVILLE, Dec. 12.—In the Constitutional Convention, to-day, among the propositions offered was one restricting the right of suffrage to white persons, and one prohibiting the legislature authorizing the intermarriage of whites and blacks.

Bank Burglarized.

RUTLAND, Vt.—The Castleton National Bank was burglarized on Monday last of sixty four hundred dollars.

NEW YORK.

Swill Milk.—Broadway to be Widened.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Dr. Harris, in his report to the Board of Health, says that ninety per cent of the milk sold in this city is adulterated; he condemns swill milk as unhealthy.

KANSAS.

Organization of Legislature.—Governor's Message.

TOPEKA, Dec. 12.—The Kansas legislature convened yesterday in the new Capitol building at Topeka. Jacob Statter, of Emporia, the newly-elected speaker of the House and a full list of officers were elected, including Miss Emma Campbell, of Topeka, as enrolling clerk. The Governor's message will be delivered to-morrow. All the officers of the House are either crippled soldiers, widows or soldiers' orphans.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton.—The Message of Governor Randolph shows an excess of receipts over expenditures, and assets enough on hand to pay all the debts of the State.
