FOREIGN.

LONDON, 30.—The Commons will take a recess during the Whitsuntide holidays, adjourning on the 12th of May to June first.

The elections in Stroud and Gloucester are annulled on account of bribery, and new elections ordered.

The last meeting of the Royal Geographical Society conferred an honorary fellowship on Stanley.

BERLIN, 30.—Von Arnim has resigned his ambassadorship.

MADRID, 30.—Official dispatches announce that fighting was resumed before Bilbao on Wednesday, and some of the advanced positions of the Carlists were captured with slight loss.

LONDON, 1.—The *Daily News* says the lock-out of the farm laborers will soon be submitted to arbitration for settlement.

The steamship *Prussian*, which sailed from Liverpool yesterday, for Quebec, took out 50 Warwickshire farm hands, and 180 children, to find homes in Canada, the next steamer of the same line will carry 150 laborers from the agricultural districts.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 1.—The famine is prevailing in Asia Minor; it is reported that in the town of Angora a hundred deaths from starvation occur daily.

BAYONNE, 1.—Five hundred soldiers, wounded in recent engagements with the Carlists before Bilbao, have arrived at Santander.

MADRID, 1.—Information has been received that two thousand Carlists have been defeated by nine hundred nationals in the province of Tarragona. The republicans lately disposed of several bands of Carlists in Arragon.

LONDON, 2.—The *Post*, in an editorial on American finance, remarks that the hopes of the complete victory, in the next Presidential election, entertained by the inflationists, or properly speaking the repudiationists, are melancholy to contemplate; but should they be realized, then the Declaration of Independence would be celebrated by a declaration of the independence of common honesty. The most ominous feature is that the struggle is sharply defined by geographical limits, and threatens to become sectional, like the anti-slavery contest.

MADRID, 2.—Additional dispatches state that Gen. Concha, who left the sea coast several days ago with twenty thousand men to attack the Carlists in the rear, gained the heights on the left bank of the river Nerveta, above Soharerte. The Carlist general Andechaqua was killed in the engagements. Previous to the deliverance of Bilbao by Serrano's troops the church in San Pedro Abanto was nearly demolished by the fire of the Republicans.

BERLIN, 2.—Dr. Schumaker, at present German Minister to Bogota, is to succeed Dr. Johannes Roesing as Consul General at New York.

BAYONNE, 3.—The Carlists deny the truth of the report of the occupation of Bilbao by the republicans, and claim that the Carlists still occupy formidable positions at Baracaldo, Sorroga and Castañazano, where they are disputing the advance of Serrano.

BERLIN, 3.—The Emperor of Russia and the Grand Duke Alexis and Constantine have arrived here on the way to England.

LONDON, 3.—The Spanish Embassy's advices confirm the report of the occupation of Bilbao by the government troops, but the latest dispatches from Carlist sources say that Serrano entered Portugalite on Friday p.m., and immediately started for Bilbao. The Carlists concentrated between Portugalite and Bilbao, and a desperate battle began at five o'clock on Saturday morning, the result of which is yet unknown. In the meantime the Carlist siege battery redoubled their fire on Bilbao.

The *Observer* announces that Sir Robert Peel will resign his position as Liberal "whip," on account of ill-health.

A large crowd of persons visited the steamer *Farraday* at Woolwich to-day. The *Farraday* is taking on board the new direct Atlantic cable, 2,400 miles, which is now ready; the steamer will sail in about ten days for New Hampshire. She will be landed on this side, at a point fifteen miles south of Valencia.

LONDON, 4.—A steamer with a

section of the Central American cable, to be laid from Para to Dematis, sailed from Gravesend yesterday.

A decree has been issued in Madrid, calling a levy of all persons liable to military duty over nineteen years of age.

Intelligence from Fije states that the King and people are unanimously in favor of the cession of the islands to Great Britain.

MADRID 4.—Serrano entered Bilbao on Saturday. There was great rejoicing here on Saturday evening, and a general illumination. The municipality have sent congratulatory dispatches to Serrano and Concha.

A priest, lately discharged from a lunatic asylum, attempted to assassinate Pi Y. Margall; he shot twice at Margall and, missing him, shot himself fatally.

THE UTAH CONTESTED ELECTION CASE.—In another part of today's NEWS will be found a portion of the argument of Mr. Halbert E. Paine, counsel for the sitting member, in the Utah contested election case, before the House Committee on Elections, at Washington the present session. The argument of Mr. Paine will be highly interesting to our many readers and to every one concerned in the welfare of Utah. We design to complete the publication of the argument in the NEWS at as early a date as we reasonably can.

In this connection we may refer to the news from Washington, in our dispatches published to-day, to the effect that the committee had reported to the House in favor of the election of the sitting member, Hon. Geo. Q. Cannon. An opposite result never was nor could be held possible by men of intelligence and candor. It was probably partly in anticipation of such a report that other fellow resolved to come marching home to other day. A one-tenth minority vote is slender basis for argument or anything else in any legislative body, though backed by the most powerful partisan prejudices and unlimited lies.


