STATE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL. The following communication from the officers of the Utah State Industria self explanatory:

To the Editor: Our attention has been called to the following article, appearing on page 7 of your issue of Jan. 21, 1903;

"Manti, Sanpete Co., Jan. 19.—Leon-ard Willardson, who last Thursday was found guilty by a jury for having had carnal knowledge of a female unde the age of consent, was this afternoon sentenced to serve one year in the peni-tentiary. Will irdson is only 17 years old and hardly realizes the seriousness of the situation. In passing sentence Judge Johnson observed that it had been his intention to send the defendant to the reform school at Ogden, but out of respect to the wishes of the boy's family, who expressed a desire that he be taken to the state prison rather than to the institution at Ogden, sentence vas pronounced as above. A keen de sire for the welfare of the young man no doubt actuated those who appealed to the court, and it was learned afterwards that the reason for making the request was that rumor had it that the social conditions at the reform school were so extremely bad and to such a degree calculated to demora ize a youth, that the enclosure bounded by the walls of the penitentiary was preferable, Much sympathy is felt for the family of the prisoner in this deep trouble."

WHITNEY, IDARO.

IMPRESSIVE OBSEQUIES Of Joseph and Albert Moser-Particulars of Sad Disaster.

Special Correspondence.

Whitney, Oneida Co., Ida., Jan. 24 .-The little ward of Whitney as well as the entire surrounding country, has been plunged in deepest mourning over the terrible catastrophe that caused the death of two of our brightest young

On the morning of Jan. 21 five of us, viz.: Joseph, Albert and Alma Moser, Ivan Winward and the writer, started for Cub River canyon, with three pair of sleighs, to get some firewood, already cut, near what is known as Woodward's Hollow. Arriving at our destination, Joseph said to me, "You stay here with the boys, while Albert and I go up the mountain about 150 yards, and start The two boys and I began un covering some logs under an embank Had we remaind there three mo ments longer, we should have been buried 15 feet deep beneath the snow but we felt impressed to move about two rods to the east, where some more logs were covered. We had barely begun working here

when we looked up the mountainside for the boys, but they were not to be seen. Imagine our horror at seeing snow falling over a high cliff! In less time than it takes to tell it a snowside was bearing down full upon us. Calling of a large tree about three rods farther east, I staid behind another tree, with in 10 feet of the snow, as it came down, bearing the two brothers on a deathride. Day was turned into night and we could see nothing in the direc-

tion of the slide. The river was completely dammed at once. We ran across to the opposite side, stopping at the edge of the slide and here we distinctly heard a faint groan. I frantically dug down about two feet and struck water. I sent both boys for help and hastily proceeded to cut a channel through the snow to let

the water pass by.
In about 15 minutes Alma returned with two men. I had but one shovel and as neither of the two offered to aid me, I told Alma to drive for more help and the men returned to their teams while I worked to rescue my dying

About 15 more minutes passed before

Alma returned with four men-Henry

and Anthony Head, Henry Day and Taylor Manning.

After digging 20 minutes we found the bodies. In the very spot where water was encountered at the first diggins we found Albert, only six inches deeper He was lying on his back, head up stream, dead, bruised and discolored. We had just tenderly lifted out the body when we caught a glimpse of Joseph's sweater through a gap in the snow. He was lying on his side in a cramped position, covered by only about a foot of snow, but dead and

black as his brother. A sadder procession could not be im-agined than that bearing the two dead odles to the parents, to the wife of less than four months, and to the bride to be in the near future. Today, exactly four months after Joseph's weddingday, the mortal remains of the two brothers were laid in their final abode-side by side in one grave. The pres ence of the largest funeral procession ever witnessed in this vicinity shows the respect and esteem enjoyed by the deceased, as well as the intense sym-pathy extended by the entire community to the bereaver familles. Not ever standing room was available in meetinghouse at the services, which were intensely impressive and touch-

Evidently the boys' time to pass beyond the vell had come, for by taking a few steps to either side and seizing hold of the trees or brushes, they would have escaped, but they had no warning till the snow was upon them. I learned today that another snowslide of much greater proportions descended in the same place, but a few hours after we left. We cannot but acknowledge the hand of God in sparing the lives of

Albert Moser was 19 years of age. and his brother Joseph was 23. The lat ter was married Sept. 24 last to Miss Vernessa Winward. He returned last May from performing a faithful mis-sion in Germany. He was second coun-selor in the M. I. A. presidency and teacher in the Sunday school of Whitney. Albert was a student of the Onelrespected, honorable and upright. They were large, powerful men, bright and intelligent and seemed to have had a splendid future before them.
