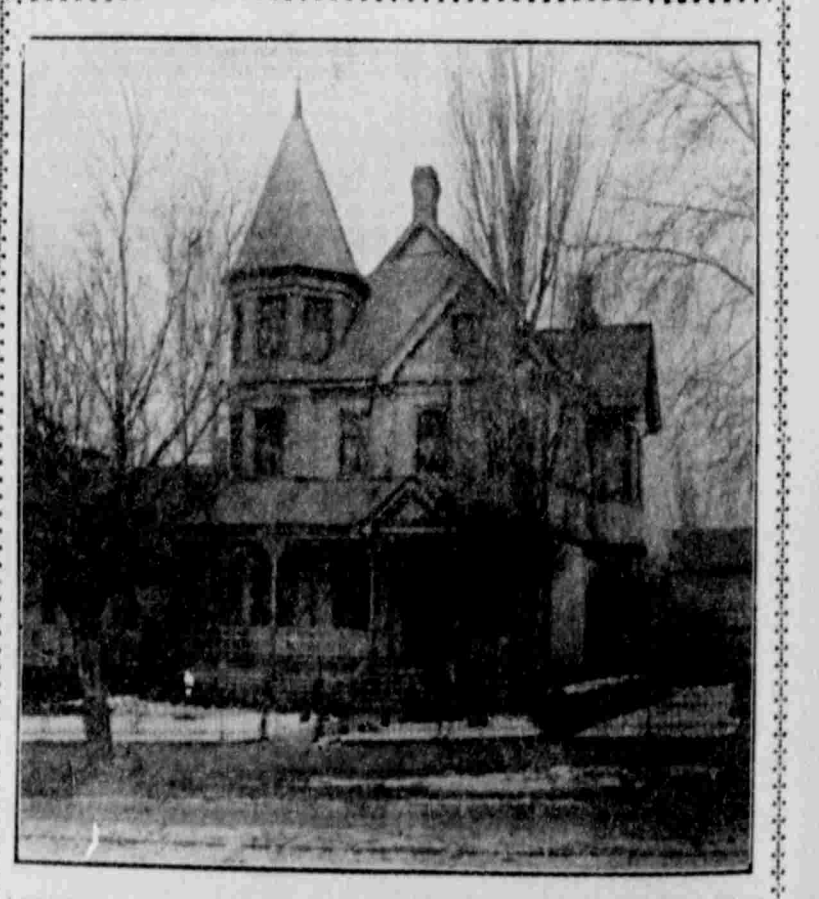

The house is of two stories and a half, the upper part being used for an attic.
