Bob Fitzsimmons Says Jeffries Can Hold Title Until He Is Old.

HE NEED NEVER BE WHIPPED.

Old Man of the Ring Says Jeff Could Have Defeated Corbett in the First Round.

In a recent interview had between Sporting Writer Robert Edgren and Bob Fitzsimmons, the latter gave his opinion of champion of heavyweights, Jim Jeffrics, Ruby Robert's opinion of the big fellow will have much weight with fight fans in this city and elsewhere. "Jeff used to think that he had to use a lot of boxing in his fights, like other men. But he doesn't. The more he gets away from that idea the better he will

fight. "Jeff is a man like John L. Sullivan. He can take any amount of beating and never feel it. Punching him is like punch-ing an iron statue on somebody's front lawn. Nobody can hurt him much with

I wasn't stunned, but I couldn't have gotten up to my feet and put up my hands to save my life. I guess Corbett won't forget the way leff walloped him in the stomach, and Sharkey won't either. "Jeff is a good, hard straight puncher. He doesn't need to know anything about defending himself or getting away or any of the 'clever' stunts that a boxer like Corbett or O'Brien uses. He has the physique to take a beating. It doesn't make much difference to him whether the other man is doing a tot of punching or not. He can walk right into it and double discount it with his own walloo. "Another thing. Jeff does not need to train, like most fighters. He is so strong and full of endurance that he doesn't have to do a lot of road work to get into shape for a long fight. He is better and quicker without it, He is getting quicker all the time. From now on no boxer who has shown up yet will have a chance with the champion."

WATER SUPPLY FOR SALT LAKE. Prest. Holmes Addresses Board of Governors of the Commercial Club. HE URCES IMMEDIATE ACTION. Calls Attention to the Precipitation Which is Wholly Inadequate For Present Needs. There was a special meeting of the

board of governors of the Commercial club last evening when President E. F Holmes again called attention to the urgent need of establishing a permanent water supply for this city. He presentd the following letter for consideration:

"Gentlemen-As chairman of the executive committee and the committee of fifty appointed in 1902 to consider the matter of a permanent water supply for Salt Lake City, 1 would state that during the early part of 1963. those committees, after making an exhaustive examination of the subject prepared a plan that seemed to the club most desirable and received the approval of the board of governors. This plan contemplated a most comprehensive plan of financing, together with specific recommendations regarding the work to be done, accompanied with maps and approved of and helped by the city engineer. The plan contem-plated the creation of a special board

of water commissioners ander an act that was framed by the club committee on laws and legislation, which said act failed of passage by the Legislature of the state. Not as it is understood on the merits of the plan itself, but in the matter of the commission itself, and since which time nothing has been

done. Now it is recommended that the matters be again taken up or the subject otherwise disposed of, as at pres ent the matter stands as unfinished business. There are in connection with this examination of the subject highly important and interesting matters that

must be of value to any person or per-sons working on this problem, one of the greatest if not the greatest that ever will come before this people.

"During the past year little has been done by the city to improve this condition: and while it was hoped that the past winter and the year just closed would witness a greater precipitation. which would aid us in overcoming the present shortage in the available wa-ter supply, the hope has not been borne out by the facts.

"The average precipitation for the last 30 years, as outlined in the city engineer's report, has been 15.90 inches; the average for the last five years has been 14.24 inches. The precipitation for 1903 was 14.02 inches, be-
