LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS. THERMOMETER 57 degrees F. in the shade, at 1 p. m. to-day. Breezy and cloudy.
Utah Iron.—Ten tons more of Utah iron is on the way to thicity from the Western Company's works at Iron City.
Expected Home.—Bishop John Sharp, superintendent of the Utah Central Railroad, will arrive in this City to-night, having accomplished the object of his visit to the East.
The Extension.—The grade of the street railroad extension along South Temple street is nearly completed from the Valley House to the News office corner, and the iron laid.
Iron for the Utah Western.—A private despatch received in this City to-day states that seven cars of iron for the Utah Western Railroad would leave Kearny junction to-night. It is expected that the balance will come along at the rate of from three to five cars a day.
Snowing in City Creek.—A man who came down from City Creek Canyon yesterday, where he had been getting out wood, states that it had been snowing there more or less for a week, and that in the gulches it was from three to five feet deep. The weather was so severe that he had to give up his work and return home.
Corner Loading.—Philadelphia has an ordinance against "corner loading." The report of the chief of police of that City, for 1873, states that 377 arrests were made during that period for that offense. If the corner loaders in this city just now were to be arrested there would be quite a stream of offenders flowing City Hall-wards from the corners of the business centre.
A Harvest.—There are at least two classes of workmen who have plenty of employment—tailors and shoemakers. Customers have generally to wait from three days to three weeks before their orders can be filled, the reason assigned for the delay being invariably that there is so much work on hand that it is impossible to fill orders more promptly. This is indeed a harvest for the knights of the goose and St. Crispin.
Land Office Business.—We are informed by Mr. W. Pottinger, Register of the Land Office in this City, that an agent and attorney for the Union Pacific Railroad Company will be at the Land Office in this City on the 19th of the present month, when it will be to the interest of all parties, whose claims have been suspended or held for cancellation on account of the claims of the U. P. Company to attend. All interested should bear this in mind.
Pushing Ahead.—We learn that the Utah Southern Railroad Company have one and a half miles of iron on hand towards the track of the extension from Provo to Santaquin. The surveyors have already run the direct lines as far south as Payson, and are now at work on the cross sections in order to hasten the letting out of grading contracts. A hundred and fifty men are at work on the grade, and others are being employed daily as the contracts are being awarded.
Severely Injured.—We are informed that a son of Bishop A. H. Raleigh, of the 19th Ward, met with a severe accident last night, being knocked down by a horse, which stepped upon his chest and face, causing lock-jaw. We are told that his condition last night was considered precarious.
Our Country Contemporaries. Ogden Junction, Nov. 5.—"A. C." writing from Brigham City, on the 2nd inst., says: "The boys have killed quite a number of bears in the canyon for the last three days, among which are counted some grizzly monsters."
Dr. T. E. Brown a few days ago amputated successfully a portion of the foot of Wm. Fowler, son of Samuel Fowler, of Hooper, which had been terribly cut by a horse while he was chopping wood.
The unfortunate man whose mutilated body was brought into Ogden on the C. P. train yesterday, was well known to several persons in Ogden. He was a miner, who held claims in Shasta, California, and had been prospecting in Weber Canyon, and also in Cache Valley, where he had discovered an iron lode. Strange to say no one seems to know his name. He sold a horse for \$15 last Monday, in this city, and was helped by two men on the fruit car going West, in the evening. He had been drinking freely. The following version was given by the Coroner's jury yesterday afternoon: Territory of Utah, Ogden Precinct, Inquest held in the U. P. car on the body of a man, name unknown. The jurors whose names are hereto affixed, on their oaths do say that the deceased came to his death from being run over by a C. P. train, while stealing a ride on a fruit car. JOSEPH PARRY, M. J. CRAY, MILBURN RAY, JOSHUA WILLIAMS, Coroner. Beaver Telegram, Nov. 5. By private telegram per Deseret Telegraph Line, we learn that T. Potter, brother to Mr. Gardner Potter, of Beaver, was terribly cut and injured by a circus saw at Ogden on the C. P. train, at 10 o'clock on Saturday, Oct. 31st, and suffered extremely until Sunday about 1 p. m., when he expired. Deseret Telegram has the price of his life, and much respect for his industrious habits. We did not learn the particulars as to how the accident occurred. Generally a day passes in Utah where five or six men, some of whom are

on their way to St. George, to work on the Temple, while others are going to Dixie to open up new cotton farms.
Provo County Times, Nov. 5.—We were shown an excellent quince, by Mr. Strickland, grown in his orchard in this city, which measured eleven inches in circumference.
Yesterday the grand jury of the First Judicial District of the Territory of Utah, terminated their labors for want of business, and adjourned sine die. We are assured by competent persons, that the jury during their deliberations, have been free of any strife or unpleasant feelings, but everything has worked harmoniously, and they have discharged their duty with considerable ability. During the fourteen days in which they were in session about 18 in citizens were found. They separated with the most friendly relationship, assured that their services will be duly remunerated by Uncle Sam and the Territory, as soon as they appropriate the funds for that purpose. So far as we have been able to learn, the jury speak well of the Prosecuting Attorney, who, during their deliberations, has treated them with respect, and he has been free of hatred or animosity. We are pleased to learn that this is the case, though we see no reason why he or any one else should appear and act otherwise.
