THOUSANDS PASS AND VIEW IT

On the Casket Are the Helmet of a Cavalry Officer and the Royal Insignia.

Copenhagen, Feb. 13 .-- In contrast with the extreme simplicity of the death chamber at the Amelienborg palace, the body of King Christian lies in state tonight in the Slotskirke, surrounded by the impressive majesty befitting a king. On the casket is a helmet of a dash-

Facing the coffin head stand seven high naval and military officers in full uniform with black wands, and six others with halbreds hung with crepe guard the dead monarch on either side. At the base of the platform stands ene of the king's personal adjutants, with the great silver flons, comprising the arms of Denmark, representing the sound and the great and little belts which have been used at anointments and funcarls of Danish kings since 1670. Almost the entire foreground of the chapel is carpeted with wreaths and foral trophies and the walls are lifted with paims and other tributes which are said to number 2,009. They Are Carefully Going Over The Financial Features of The Divorce Case.

COUNT IN DEEP DESOLATION.

To His Friends He Asserts His Continued Affection for His Wife And Children.

Paris, Feb. 13 .- Count Boni de Castellane had a long conference today with the lawyers of the countess, his wife. This was one of several meetings at which the two parties concerned have carefully gone over the financial features of the case with the view of determining the exact form of the future procedure and ultimate decree. In the meantime the countess bill of complaint is being prepared but has not yet been filed, as the form will has not yet been filed, as the form will depend upon the pending conferences over financial affairs. If these are sat-isfactorily adjusted, the countess' bill of complaint is likely to be materially modified so as to contain only incom-patibility or other grounds within the statute, but avoiding allegations of a scandalous mature. However, the conferences are not for the purpose of reconciliation, as all

scandalous nature. However, the conferences are not for the purpose of reconciliation, as all concerned, including the count and countess and their lawyers, appear to recognize the fulfilly of any further attempt to reunite the family. The present indications, therefore, are that after the parties reach a financial un-dersunding the bill will be modified and a decree entered by mitual con-sent. This decree probably will be for a separation, as the French law per-mits such a decree being extended to a complete divorce after three years. Thus far, however, the countess has not decided whether the bill shall ask for a complete annulment of her mar-riage. Her friends are rather inclined to restrict the decree to a separation, as this would prevent the re-marinage of either party within three years, thus putting an end to the rumor that the countess intend to marry again, which her friends characerize as ab-surd. Until the bill is finally framed and filed the courts will not formally possess the document explicitly set-ting forth the grounds of the action. SAVED HIS BOY.

HIGHER WAGES FOR DIAMOND CUTTERS.

New York. Feb. 14 -- In ell the diamond cutting and polishing factories a higher standard of wages is to be granted and for the first time in 10 years apprentices will be received, under the terms of a year's agreement signed yesterday by com-mittees, representing the diamond manu-facturors' association of American and the diamond workers' protective union. Under the new contract which is effec-tive at once, 200 polishers in New York will each receive an advance of M a week, so that the weekly salary will range from \$34 to \$60. The actures will get a 10 per cent advance. The cutters, who are paid by the piece, are content with \$35 to \$75 a week. There are as of them in the city and they prefer the piece plan to salarles. About 35 apprentices are to be put in the shops to learn the polishing trade, the number being computed for every 19 journeymen. for the first time in 10 years apprentices
