"MUCKRAKING" IN CARBON.

Inspector Clark's Report on Drinking Water Supply,

Inspector Clark of the state board of health has handed in a report of his observations as to hygenic conditions in Carbon county. These reflect anything but credit on the local idea as to what constitutes a healthy status. Dr. Clark investigated Wellington, Price, Helper, Castle Gate, Colton, Schofield, and Clear Creek, all of which are located on the banks of the Price river and receive their water supply from that stream. The inspector says the water from the river is none too pure at best: but after receiving the filth emenating from human beings. cattle, and seepage from corrals, pig pens, etc., it is easy to see that the local health is seriously menaced. For instance, the town of Wellington is obliged to use water made unfit for use even by animals, by the use of the water in the town next above Wel-lington; and as the water goes down stream, it becomes worse. The peo-ple in some of the towns recognize the danger, and are building setting tanks, and in places, filters, but these same people close their eyes to the dangers of the populations below them, continuing to make the river there a receptacle for their own gar-bage and filth of all kinds. In some instances, outhouses are hung over the banks of the stream, and in many others they are so close that the seep-age goes directly into the river. In some places there is a large barn 50 fet from the river, and the yards surrounding the barn with its horses and cattle are not fenced off from the stream. So the animals have access to its waters, and in hot weather one may readily imagine that the river becomes the resort for them. Tendial measures should be insti-tuted at once; and where there is not sufficient law to cover the premises, by a state officer with power to see that the local situation is straight-ened out without delay. The local authorities cannot and will not exer-cise the powers given them, and the state authorities must act. The banks of Price river should be carefully cleaned, and in habitation, outhouse, corral, or pig pen be allowed within at least 70 feet of the stream.
