EAST CANYON RESERVOIR.

Davis and Weber County Canal Company Will Raise Dam 25 Feet This Season.

Memorial Services in Honor of Dr. Park \$20,000 Damage Suit—Police Court Notes—Wedding Permits.

A meeting of the Davis and Weber County Canal company's stockholders was held yesterday afternoon in the court house for the purpose of considering the proposition of raising their East Canyon dam. The attendance was very great, about 75 per cent of the stockholders being present. The proposition of raising the dam was thoroughly discussed by some good speakers, who showed the great necessity of the work being done and everything being put into shape to store up water for next year. The matter of increasing the capital stock from 4,000 shares to 5,000 was voted upon and unanimously carried in favor of the building of 25 feet on the dam, which will increase the capacity of the reservoir 167,000,000 cubic feet. The present capacity is 203,000,000. The cost of the new work will amount to \$40,000. The directors of the company were instructed to commence work at once, which will be done and the dam pushed to completion. The work will be under the supervision of Civil Engineer W. M. Hostath.

IN HONOR OF DR. PARK.

The public schools of Ogden were closed yesterday out of respect to the late Dr. John R. Park, Superintendent of public instruction. At the high school and in all of the grammar grades appropriate services were observed. The directors of the school were instructed to commence work at once, which will be done and the dam pushed to completion. The work will be under the supervision of Civil Engineer W. M. Hostath.

SUIT FOR \$20,000 DAMAGES.

A suit was filed today by W. O. Johnson, through his attorney, W. L. McDonald, against the Southern Pacific Railroad company, asking for \$20,000 damages alleged to be due because of injuries received in an accident which occurred August 5, by the said Johnson while in the employ of the railroad company at the time of his brakeman.

Johnson, having had a hand crushed so that amputation was necessary, and alleges that the accident was due to the negligence of the railroad company in not having its cars provided with automatic couplers.

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IN HONOR OF DR. J. R. PARK.

Memorial Services Held—Court Cases

—Licensed to Wed.

Provo, Utah, October 4, 1899.—Memorial services in honor of Dr. John R. Park, president of the Brigham Young Academy, this forenoon. Speeches were made by Judge J. E. Booth, District Attorney Sam A. King and President George H. Brimhall, who spoke words of praise and admiration of Dr. Park as an educator and as a man. The academy choir sang, "Rest, rest for the weary soul," and Miss Bush rendered a solo, "Come unto Me." The following was sent:

IN THE DISTRICT COURT.

The jury brought in a verdict of guilty last evening, in the case of the State v. H. Mower, which has been on trial in the Fourth district court for the last two days. Demise of George S. Stringfellow — Succumbed to Paralysis.

Draper, Salt Lake County, Oct. 4.—George S. Stringfellow, one of Draper's most highly respected and progressive citizens, died October 1st of a paralytic stroke which he received a month ago.

Mr. Stringfellow was born in Nottingham, England, April 18, 1869. His father died when he was a boy, and he came to America with his mother at the age of two years and settled in Draper which has been his home ever since. Mr. Stringfellow was a man of marked business ability, and filled many offices of trust: was full of integrity and push. He was a student of County Commissioners, a member of the Masonic Lodge, a brother to Senator J. L. Hawkins. He leaves a wife and seven children to mourn the loss of a faithful, kind and affectionate husband and father.

The funeral services were held Thursday, Oct. 4th at 2 p. m., at Draper ward meeting house.
