Counterfeits Arrested.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., 11.—The
American's Decatur, Ala., special,
which left U. S. Marshal's station at
Nashville this p.m., with J. C. Gra-
ham, of Gainesville, Sumter Co.,
R. S. Nell, Alex. and Geo. Samp-
son, and Jno. Hooty, of Tuscaloosa,
Ala., charged with counterfeiting.

I. B. Bowers, now under arrest
here for counterfeiting, was fore-
man of the last grand jury of Jackson
County, steward of the M. E. Church,
and superintendent of a Sab-
bath school. When arrested
Bowers had on his person \$100 in
counterfeit fifty cent fractional cur-
rency, and \$300 in counterfeit \$5
and \$20 legal tenders. Bowers,
socially well known, is now in
custody, and gave bonds for \$20,000.
The marshal from the middle dis-
trict of Tennessee arrived to-day,
having custody of W. J. Gordon,
of Lynville, Tenn., who is charged
with the same offense. His sec-
tion have commanded the
respect of the community. It is
claimed that his connection with
the counterfeiting was purely
accidental.

To-night U. S. Marshal Baker, will
carry the prisoners, twelve in num-
ber, to Huntsville, Ala.

Indian Matters.

MUSKOGEE, I. T., 11.—Gen. J. P. C.
Shank, special U. S. commis-
sioner, arrived in the territory to-
day. He is on his way to Chicka-
saug, to attend the national council,
now in session at that place, with a
view to settle the future status of
the colored people held as slaves by
the Indians before emancipation.

By the provisions of the treaty of
1866 the U. S. agrees to treat the
Choctaws and Chickasaws for the
proceeds of the sale of the leased
lands, and forty per cent of the sum
owned by them, in the sum of \$800,
000, contingent upon their admit-
ting their former slaves and their
descendants to the rights of citi-
zenship, and to the right of suffrage.

The national council, which was
called to order by the U. S. com-
missioner, is now in session, and
will continue for several days. The
commissioner will be present, and
will act as mediator between the
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
