NEW YORK.—The annual report

of the general agent of the Peabody

Fund, Dr. Barnes Sears, gives an

encouraging review of the general

condition of public schools in the

Southern states, and says the en-

couraging circumstances vastly pre-

dominate over the discouraging.

The following table shows the

condition of the public schools in

the report for Va.: "The public

schools in this State for the year

ending August 1, 1872, number 5,605,

and the school population 411,021,

of whom 208,002 are white, in

North Carolina the condition of

public schools, and education gen-

erally, is far from satisfactory. There

is an alarming indifference on the

subject among the common people,

and want of union and party co-op-

eration in the schools. In South

Carolina there are few

schools. The Legislature, at its

last session, appropriated over \$300,

000 for educational purposes, but

not one-half of the amount has

been received from the Treasury.

The result is that nearly all the

public schools have been closed.

In Georgia the effort, thus far, to

establish the public school system,

has resulted in a comparative fail-

ure. In Florida three-fourths of

the schools have been closed, and

reached by the educational system,

but the ratio is rapidly changing.

In Louisiana there are 4,000 black

and 17,000 white who cannot read

or write. In Mississippi there are

4,500 public schools, with an aggre-

gate attendance of 125,000, and 400

private schools with 148,750 pupils

enrolled. In Louisiana \$7,800 was

contributed to the State of Texas

for the purpose of establishing

schools in that State. In Texas

there are in an unsettled state, and

in school matters the trustees do

not feel justified in making any

report. In Arkansas the number of

children of school age is 194,314,

the number attending school 32,863.

In Tennessee the number of chil-

dren of school age is about 40,000.

In Western Virginia there are a

few schools, and in operation, run

at an expense of three-quarters of

a million annually."
