LOCAL BRIEFS.

Breeden Invited.—Atty. Gen. M. A. Breeden has been invited to attend the fourteenth annual conference of the department of Utah county of the Indian War Veterans association, near Provo, Aug. 25-31.

Rev. Spencer Here.—Rev. C. B. Spencer, of Kansas City, editor of the Central Christian Advocate, will preach in the First Methodist church tomorrow morning, and in the evening, Rev. Dr. Freeman D. Boyd of Berkeley, Cal., editor of the California Christian Advocate, will preach.

Special Meeting.—A special meeting of the Woman's Democratic club has been called for Monday at 3 p. m. The meeting will be held at the residence of Mrs. Roundy, 142 West North street. Important business is to be transacted and members are urged to be present.

Nauvoo Legion.—The next monthly meeting of the association of the Nauvoo legion, will be held Monday evening, Aug. 20, at 8 o'clock in the legion's office, 11th and 12th streets. A full attendance is requested, as considerable business has to be attended to after a recess of two months.

Bishop Moore to Speak.—Bishop D. H. Moore will preach in the First Methodist church tomorrow morning, the sermon to be followed by an ordination service. The bishop will dedicate the First Scandinavian M. E. church, 523 Fourth East street. The evening speaker at the First Methodist church will be Rev. Dr. C. B. Spencer.

Typhoid at Waterloo.—Typhoid is occasioning considerable of a scare in Waterloo where it is claimed that in 25 families there are 24 cases of the fever. The city water is not the cause, as the people do not there use wells, and it is claimed that milk is the source of difficulty. The county authorities are making an investigation.

To Lay Corner Stone.—The program for the laying of the corner stone of the Westminster Presbyterian college next Thursday includes a scripture reading by Rev. J. E. Carver of Ogden, a history of the college and laying of the stone by Rev. Dr. R. G. McNiece, dean of the college; a paper by Rev. N. E. Clemson of Logan and an address by President Stevenson.

Many Grass Fires.—Yesterday afternoon was a busy time for the fire department, five runs in all being the record. Only one, however, proved to be of any consequence and that was a fire in a barn, owned by a Mr. A. H. McKay, belonging to Daniel McKay, near Thirteenth South and Third East, was consumed, after several acres of surrounding dry grass had been burned.

In Valparaiso.—John M. Condon of 244 West Fourth South street is in Valparaiso, but is believed to be safe. He had written home that he did not like the country and proposed to return to the United States by the way of Cape Horn. Harry K. Madsen, formerly superintendent at Brigham Junction for the United States Mining company, is superintendent of an English smelter near Valparaiso.

Phelan Arrested.—Justice of the Peace J. J. Williams of Brigham Junction, yesterday ordered J. P. Phelan to appear for preliminary hearing. Phelan is charged with attempted assault on a 15-year-old girl, named Gertrude Sanders. Phelan put up a \$200 bond, but was again arrested a short time afterwards and the bonds were increased to \$1,000. In default of bail, Phelan was sent to the county jail.

Must Pay in Cash.—Receiver Hodgman of the United States land office at Madiay, has issued a notice stating that all persons who intend to buy lots in the townships of Heburn and Rupert should take special notice of the fact that the law requires they be paid in cash, and within one hour after the acceptance of bid by the receiver and receiver. Checks, drafts or money orders will not be acceptable under the law.

Clements Missing.—W. M. Clements, who for some time has been manager of the Emory-Holmes cafe, has disappeared, and his whereabouts is unknown to his friends here. His accounts are said to be entirely straight, and the reasons for his going are a mystery. Clements left a note for John S. Bransford informing him of his departure, but no reasons were assigned. Clements has a wife and four children living at 83 Canyon road.

Senator Scott Here.—United States Senator N. B. Scott of West Virginia and wife arrived last evening, and registered at the Knutsford. The senator is interested in Park City mining properties and will give a lecture to them, while here. He is president of one of the largest glass works in the east, and is president of the Dollar Savings bank of Wheeling. Senator Scott is a Union army veteran. He was formerly a member of the Republican national committee, and commissioner of internal revenue.

Big Organ Recital Crowd.—The attendance at yesterday's tabernacle organ recital was perhaps the largest of the season. The program included the Faulkes' "Toccata," as difficult a piece of fugue work as was ever written, a work suggesting that the composer was endeavoring to outdo the great Bach. Dr. Faulkes succeeded in composing fugue that will tax the powers of the best artist to perform. It is in sixteenth for the first and third movements, mostly with the right hand, the work being occasionally transferred to the left to rest the much taxed right, with a largo as the second movement for contrast and relief.

BISHOP MOORE ON CHINA.

Interesting Service at Afternoon Session of Methodist Conference—Final Meeting Monday.

During yesterday's afternoon session of the Utah Mission of the Methodist Episcopal church, the election of officers of the Woman's Home Missionary society supplied the principal feature. Those chosen were as follows:

Some little time was given up to the reading of the reports of the various auxiliary societies of the church, and all of these showed a condition of prosperity which left little to be desired.

A full report was submitted on the case of Gladstone Coates, a boy of six years at present being brought up and educated by the Missionary society. When it is said to be progressing favorably with his studies, and under the efficient care of the society, bids fair to develop eventually into a useful member of society.

The lecture of Bishop Moore during the evening session was well attended and listened to with deep interest. The bishop has traveled extensively in China, and, indeed, throughout the entire east, and is well posted on conditions as they exist. He referred briefly to the state of the country leading up to the Boxer outbreak in 1900, at which time he himself was a member of the small foreign population of Peking. He described the character of the people and the deep seated hatred obtained upon them through their teachings of idolatry and superstition. That the work of reclaiming this great but benighted people would be a work of years and attended with difficulties that might well make the strongest heart quail, goes without saying, but the foreign mission branch of the church was equal to the call as evidenced by the progress already made along these lines.

Bishop Moore declared that for many reasons China should receive the chief efforts of the church towards Christianization. Not only by reason of religious claims but because of the fact that in many ways the country was one of the greatest on earth, and when properly educated will prove an inexhaustible market for American goods, and thus indirectly advance to a considerable extent the commercial interests of the country.

China is rich in mineral wealth, so little actual development of this having been done that no one knows just how great the extent of this may be. The people are clever, resourceful and quick to learn, and properly educated and taught the importance of their own country, may some day become one of the foremost powers of the world.

The bishop closed with a further tribute to the unselfish and untiring zeal of the workers in the foreign mission field and exhorted his hearers to do all in their power to assist the efforts of the society in every way in their power.
