LOCAL BRIEFS.

AMONG THE STARS IN GLORY'S FIELD

None Brighter Than Utah, Declared Past Commander King Last Night.

FINE SPEECHES AT CAMPFIRE

Eloquent Allusion to Utah's Loyalty—
G. A. R. Badge of Bronze More Precious Than Gold.

The campfire in the Assembly hall last evening was presided over by E. R. Montford of Cincinnati. The music was splendid and the speeches by Past Commanders-in-Chief John C. Black of Chicago and John R. King of Maryland were interesting and well received.

Miss Lottie Owen rendered "Rally Around the Flag" in a delightful manner. She also sang "Marching Through Georgia." Miss Vida Fox read a patriotic selection and C. H. Taylor, a veteran, sang, "I Love to Sing the Old Songs Best."

John C. Black was the first speaker, and said in part:

"You have heard and seen today one of the greatest exhibitions of power in a republic that your eye and ear shall ever see or hear again. Through the streets of your city have been marching men who represent the greatest contest the world has ever known. That contest extended over four years of time, embracing a great area and opposed by the mightiest armies, both well trained and inspired on either side by the sense of duty, and ending at last with a victory so profound that today from end to end of the republic there is no human who does not acquiesce and rejoice in the result."

"You mountains may stand while time goes merrily on, and citizens will pass away, but never again will the present generation behold such an impressive pageant or look at so devoted to duty and honor as these men who marched in the streets."

WAR ALWAYS NECESSARY.

"War, so philosophers and all statesmen declare, is an evil and terrible. And yet war has always been and possibly always shall be necessary. These men who served in this great war were in their youth when it started. They were trained in religion and industry, and when it came they came into their lives an emergency and a great problem to solve."

"As I came from the capital of this great republic, I journeyed over 4,000 miles, and I found evidence of contentment, prosperity and assured peace. Not a sign of hostility or a note of the war bugle could be heard, but it was all the energies of this great people, in the midst of the greatest war in the history of the world, and these men who marched today are the ones who made it possible for this great prosperity and industry. The dreams of some ambitious southerners don't disturb this condition of peace."

A COLONY FROM ILLINOIS.

"Sixty-two years ago a band of people in Illinois set out for a place where they could worship as they wished, and where they could be free from the dictates of any man. They climbed the Rockies and settled in this barren and barricaded section. A loud cry of America for expansion stretched out and wrested dominion over the region. Years passed and the conflict came on. In the struggle, this little band was not represented. As the territory of Utah grew, however, it yielded and opened up its borders and stood ready for citizenship in the great American republic. The republic welcomed her. The senators and representatives are received gratefully, and today her star shines as brightly as any in the field of Old Glory."

"When, after several years, and another conflict came on, and a call was made upon the states to stand, Utah did not remain silent, but sent her boys rushing forward and helped in the victory and put the American flag on the islands."

GLEN KING'S BLOQUENUE.

At the beginning of his remarks, Mr. King spoke of the value of the G. A. R. badge, which was then about a year old, and would not be exchanged for one of gold or silver. In conclusion he said:

"As we grow older we grow more reminiscent, and proud of our four years' service. The records of the nation's capital will show that the boys of '61 did. However, if you are not satisfied, go to Seminary Ridge, Gettysburg and Lookout Mountain, and the many other bloody fields of war. The record is there of how thousands of men died that the republic might go on."

"If this country should ever become politically dead like Rome and Greece, it will be because the people forget to honor the service of her soldiers."
