Buchanan, Special American nmissioner, Given Most Cordial Welcome.

OPEN NEGOTIATIONS.

For Re-establishment of Diplomatic Relations-Gomez Anxious to Reach Agreement.

Caracas, Venezuela, Dec. 30 .- W. I. Buchanan, the special commissioner of the American government to the government of Venezuela, arrived in Caracas today from La. Guaira. He was given a cordial reception by the officials of the new government. It has been decided to begin at once a series of conferences on the question of reestablishment of diplomatic relations between the United States and Vene-

The students of Caracas today paraded through the city, carrying a large doll dressed up to represent former President Castro. They were followed by a hooting and shouting mob. The effigy was finally burned in the Plaza Bolivar.

Mr. Buchanan will atend the presidential reception on New Year's day.

The Brazilian minister to Venezuela, who has been looking after American interests, has sent a note to the Venezuelan foreign office announcing the arzuelan foreign office announcing the ar-rival of Mr. Buchanan as a high com-missioner from the United States to treat for the re-establishment of diplo-matic relations. The Venezuelan for-eign minister, Senor Guinarl, replied as

### 'RATE DAY" HELD IN CALIFORNA

Shippers All Over State Protest Against Increase in Freight Rates.

MEANS RAISE OF \$10,000,000

If High Rates Are Not Withdrawn, Steps May be Taken to Enjoin Collection.

San Francisco, Dec. 31,-With the adoption of resolutions declaring the proposed increase of transcontinental freight rates to be unjust and a discrimination against California shippers, both importers and exporters, "rate day" was observed throughout the state yesterday by enthusiastic mass meetings in thirty-odd cities and towns. Thousands of shippers, small independent dealers as well as the large companies with widespread connections, joined in giving voice to a unanimous protest against what is termed the exaction of an unjust and unreasonable tax from the industries of this state. The new rates, which become effective Jan. 1, 1909, were prepared by the trans-continental freight bureau which is composed of representatives of all roads doing business to and from the state, and it is estimated by the shippers that the new figures will mean an increase in railroad revenues of \$10,000,000 annu-

The resolutions adopted at the meetings yesterday assert that if the railroads are operating at a loss the shippers will take legal means to ascertain the exact amount of the deficit. They further state that if the high rates are not withdrawn steps will be taken to not withdrawn steps will be taken to enjoin the railroads from collecting them. The resolutions also call the attention of the national government to the fact that the rates of the Panama railroad are deermined by the transcontinental roads.
