#### PROCLAMATION. COVERNOR'S

New Highways Projected Between Warress and Big Creek and At-

lanta and Boise.

Special Correspondence. Boise, May, 30 .- The subject of good roads is attracting considerable attention in Idaho at present. Governor Gooding has issued a proclamation calling a state good roads convention for Bolse, on June 9 and 10. It is as follows:

State Executive Office, Bolse, Ida., May 29, 1965,—Whoreas, the official good roads special, en route to Portland, Or., where the Pacific good roads convention will be held in connection with the Lewis and Clark Certennial exposition, carrying officers of the National Good Roads association, the president of the association, Col. W. H. Moore, the Hon, Martin Dodge, director of the office of public roads inquiries. United States government; leading engineers, lectur-ers and road experts, will stop in Bolso City and hold a two days' convention Friday and Saturday, June 9 and 10, 1905. Now.
Therefore, J. F. R. Gooding, governor of the State of Idaho, do Issue this proclamation, recommending that the county commissioners of each county appoint three delegates, the mayor of each eity appoint three delegates to attend the good roads convention in Bolse.
