RICH AND RACY COURT PROCEEDINGS AT BEAVER.

BEAVER, Sept. 21, 1917.
 Deseret News.—The Court, yesterday, ruled on the information against Murdoch, entered a judgment of probation for him, not only in the trial of the men who killed the Indian, but all criminal and larceny cases.

In the case of Lee vs. Lee, petitioners for divorce, Mr. Snow, for defendant, informed the court he had a written statement from the petitioner, setting the case and asked the court to enter the case settled. Mr. Hawley, for the petitioner, opposed and asked the court to direct that the statement be reported to the court for its approval, which the court refused. The case of Morgan L. Fedan, against Judge Murdoch, Sheriff Hunt and Isaac Riddle, for fifty thousand dollars damages, for larceny and convicting Fedan in the Probate court, for assault with intent to kill Riddle, is continued till the next term. It will be remembered that this is the case in which Judge Hawley, about one year ago, ruled against the constitutionality of the law, as forges was a Christiana virtue. Fedan, having the fifty thousand dollars in view, did not heed the admonition of the court.

In the afternoon some persons were arrested, being put through the motion picture. Father White, aged 74 years, applied for his papers and was caught and taken to the jail. He had been in the law of 1882, he replied that the constitution would every man the right to live his life according to the dictates of his own conscience. He had but one wife, was not married, and not likely to have any more. He being somewhat deaf of course made a little loud, which annoyed the officers, who thought he was making a scene. He was taken to the jail, and the old man insisted on his speaking a few words in his defense, which the court, in a preliminary, granted, and afterwards limited the time.

Richard Palmer of Cedar applied for his papers and was questioned with regard to property and the law of 1882. He replied he was willing to stand the constitution. The court, respecting the honesty of the applicant, and would hold his case until the next day, having exercised itself before the present struggle, in depriving the Probate Court of its legal powers and placing the court in relation to Kingdon, churches, republics, morality, Congress, plantations and the law of 1882, that it became completely exhausted, and adjourned and the court had to call on Judge Murdoch to occupy the bench and run the court while the court responded. Judge Murdoch is not so well versed in the law as the court, and his honor Judge Hawley.

MORONI.—Henry N. Larter, writing from Moroni, says that harvesting has been completed there. The grain crops are better than ever before, the average amount of wheat per acre being from thirty to forty bushels. The hay crop is also good.
