## WHAT SLEEP WILL CURE.

The cry for rest has always been louder than the cry for food. Not that it is more important, but it is harder to get. The best rest comes from sound sleep. Of two men or women, otherwise equal, the one that sleeps the best will be the most moral, healthy and efficient.

Sleep will do much to cure irritability of temper, peevishness, uneasiness. It will cure insanity. It will build up and made strong a weak body. It will do much to cure dyspepsia, particularly that variety known as nervous dyspepsia. It will relieve the languor and prostration felt by consumptives. It will cure hydrophobia. It will cure headache. It will cure neuralgia. It will cure a broken spirit. It will cure sorrow.

Indeed, we might make a long list of nervous maladies that it will cure.

The cure of sleeplessness, however, is not so easy, particularly in those who carry grave responsibilities. The habit of sleeping well is one which if broken up for any length of time, is not easily regained. Often severe illness treated by powerful drugs so deranges the nervous system that sleep is never sweet after. Or perhaps long continued watchfulness produces the same effect; or hard study, or too much exercise of the muscular system, or tea and whisky drinking and tobacco using. To break up the habit, are required:

1. A good clean bed.
2. Sufficient exercise to produce weariness, and pleasant occupation.
3. Good pure air and not too warm a room.
4. Freedom from too much care.
5. A clear stomach.
6. A clear conscience.
7. Avoidance of stimulants or narcotics.
