CONDEMNS THE PRESIDENT

Refers to Two of His Letters and Charges That He Seeks to Compass Their Death.

Boise, Idaho, May 1,-Charence Darrow, of counsel for Messrs, Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone, of the Wester Federation of Miners, charged with complicity in the murder of former Gov. Steunenberg, tonight issued a formal statement in behalf of the prisoners. It was anticipated that the statement would be a direct reply to President Roosevelt's "undesirable citizen" letter, but the statement is in reality a general one, and the references to the resident are to the former letters a

THE STATEMENT.

The statement follows; The statement follows;
"We have been charged with killing ex-Gov. Steunenberg with a dynamite bomb. Our trial is to begin on the 9th of this month. The details of the assassination have been published broadcast throughout the civilized broadcast throughout the civilized world for more than a year. During all this time the press of the country, and especially of that section of Idaho where we will be placed on trial, has bitterly denounced us and the Western Federation of Miners, to which we belong. The most powerful interests of the country are seeking to take our lives.

THEIR ARREST.

"We were not in Idaho for years be-fore the crime was committed. Under the law we could not be extradited from Colorado. But, in spite of this we were arrested on a perjured affidavit, charging that we were in Idaho at the time of the commission of the crime, and that we immediately fled from the state. and on this perjured affidavit, known to be false, the governors of the states of and on this perjured affidavit, known to be false, the governors of the states of Idaho and Colorado kidnapped us in the night time, refused us an interview with family, friends or counsel, or a chance of appeal to the courts, and brought us on a special train a thou-sand miles from home, and into a state and community systematically poisoned against us by experiences and effects. against us by newspapers and officials.
We have been confined in jail for 14 months against our protest, and denied bail, while constantly demanding a trial. Every effort has been made to teach the farmers, business men and workingmen of the community that we are assassins and outlaws.

SEVERE ON PRESIDENT.

"After all this time our case is about to be reached, and the president of the United States, in no way interested officially or otherwise, sends two letters broadcast over the country, charging us with gult and crime. These are republished in every paper in the land, and especially in every paper of Idaho, The governor of Colorado, a day or two later, adds his words of spite to the venom of the president, and says that we are not only guilty of the crime charged, but of many others, too. While the president of the United States and the governor of Colorado are sending out their statement to compass our death, the judge of this county has brought a citizen before him for contempt, on the charge that he tried to influence the mind of a prospective jurer by saying that the state administration was trying to railroad us." On the ap-pearance of this man in court the judge promptly told the state's attorney that state's attorney that ae should have this obscure farmer in dicted for felony because he tried to influence the mind of a prospective ju-ror. The president knows how much greater weight will be given to his words that those of an obscure private citizen.

"If we are about to be tried in court every lawabiding citizen, however great or humble, should do everything in his power to cool the passions of men, rather than add fuel to the flame. If we are to be thrown to the mob the

They were laughing at a story told by one of their counsel when they received a correspondent of the Associated Press this afternoon and the laughter went on until a discussion of the old battle of capital and tahor sobered the general conversation.

Pettibone, whom they used to call "Happy Hooligan" down in Denver, is the funmaker of the trio. He has marked native wit, and a droll, qualnt mammer of expressing himself, and even when today he made sport of his own

mamer of expressing himself, and even when today he made sport of his own execution it was impossible to refrain from laughing with him. Pettibone has taken up pyrography since his linear-ceration, and, following the introductions today, he showed several samples of his handleraft. "You men who have not been in the Couer d'Alenes and underground there know nothing of the frightful conditions that prevailed," went on Pettibone. "We are wretchedly housed and miserably fed. A company store supplied everything at outrageous prices; a company doctor was supposed to look after us, and we were paid in scrip if there was ever anything coming to us after us, and we were paid in scrip if there was ever anything coming to us when the company got through. Steunenberg, "I do not expect any such breach of the peace on the part of the people of our state, and I should very deeply regret the necessity for a declaration of martial law," went on the governor, "Any statement that martial law has ever been under consideration is absolutely without foundation."

During the parade and meeting in Congress hall, which followed it, there was no disorder. The meeting adopted resolutions for Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, One of the speakers criticized President Roosevelt's allusion to the labor leaders in the letter to Representative Sherman of New York.

Eureka, Cal., May 1.—Twenty-six hundred and fifty union woodsmen and sawmill workers walked out in the various mills of Humboldt county today as a result of the strike call issued by the executive board of the international Woodsmen and Sawmill Workers' union yesterday.
