Sawyer, of 115 Roman Road, Vistoria Park, London, in which he makes an earnest appeal for deliverance, not to President Young personally, but to these with whom he was formerly associated, and who, he believes, if they knew his present position, would, for the sake of "auld lang syne," spetch forth their hands unitedly and help him.

Brother Sawyer, according to his letter, the truth of which we have not the least reason to doubt; has been an active and useful member of the church for nearly twenty years; he is getting into years, and being now too deaf to follow his usual avocation, and having a wife, and a family of eight children, he finds himself utterly whable to effect his own deliverance, and pathetically adds, "unless I have help how shall I get home?" 230007

There are, however, many, who, if they are not rich and have not money at command, possess stock or something they can turn into money; and if, in cases like the present they should have to make a sacrifice, and even have to deprive themselves and families for a brief period of some things they deem necessaries or comforts, such a sacrifice or deprivation might be made or endured,
