THE PRICE FOR HERMAN'S HEAD.

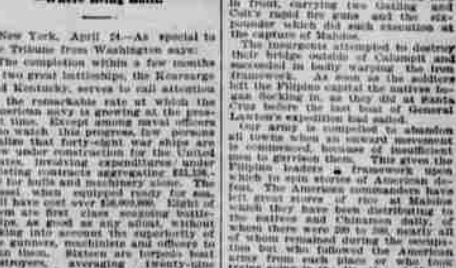
