St. GEORGE, July 5th, 1882, 1 o'clock a.m.

Editor Deseret News:

Although the very oppressive heat prevented us in a measure from the usual Fourth of July diversions, we did not forget the significance of the day. In the early morning flags were unfurled upon the various stores and public buildings and bands of music discoursed patrioticals throughout the city. Ere this, the usual firing of guns had notified us that it was an unusual occasion. At 5 o'clock teams laden with children and adults began wending their way towards the grove known as "Dodge's Spring," where appliances for their amusement had been previously erected.

By 10 o'clock a company numbering several hundred persons had assembled, all having provided themselves with a liberal picnic. The day was spent very pleasantly in the usual manner—singing, music, children romping, races for prizes, swinging, etc., not to forget "lunching."

At 5 o'clock most of the company came down to witness the horse races, which had been previously arranged. In the evening a social party and ball was given in the Court House, and altogether the day's doings were voted a success.

The Primary fair and entertainment, conducted by Mrs. Julia Evans, Mrs. J. F. Gates and others, which came off last Saturday, was a very nice affair, and reflects much credit upon those engaged therein.

We have had much rain of late, and reports from Muskete Flat and Bunkerville below us on the Rio Virgin, say that the people are nearly discouraged by the great damage done by floods, to lands, crops and houses. Our own farms have suffered much, but not to such extent as they—the dam costing many months of hard labor at Bunkerville being carried away, besides all their canals being entirely filled up by sand and mud. It is the heaviest storm known here in 20 years.

The Johnson party for old Mexico took their departure on the 23rd of June, there being a train of 11 vehicles, containing 8 families and 34 souls. All were in good health and spirits, and have the best wishes of the people for their success.—F
