I feel that this mission has been strengthened by his visit. Saints and Elders rejoice in the instructions received, and it has been the means of breaking down prejudice, and I look for better times in the future. Not forgetting Mrs. Perry who performed a most important part of the mission that could not fail to make an impression.

Prest Morgan reports the mission in a prosperous condition. His letters of advice and counsel are highly appreciated.

Georgia's Guilt and Shame.

DALTON, Ga., Oct. 22, 1879.

Editors Deseret News:

Another act in the legal farce called the trial of assassins of Elder Standing has been gone through with. They were indicted for riot and the 20th and 21st inst. were used up in getting in the testimony and pleas of the attorneys. The Judge delivered his charge and the jury retired to make up a verdict. The testimony was clear and explicit as to the criminality of the prisoner at the bar, but little doubt was expressed at the result, for it had been clearly demonstrated that it would be impossible to convict in the Whitfield County Court. Many leading citizens expressed shame and chagrin at the situation of affairs and deplored the utter inability of the better class of people to enforce the law of the land. The Prosecuting Attorney, A. T. Hackett and his assistant, Col. W. B. Moore, discharged their duties in a fearless and determined manner, and besought the court and jury to not allow this great wrong to go unpunished; for the sake of decency and the good name of the State of Georgia to punish the criminals and enforce the laws of the State that had been trampled upon in so ruthless a manner. During the time the jury was out a remarkable circumstance occurred. A negro man was brought in from the jail, charged with stealing one gallon of whisky, valued at four dollars. The jury was empanelled and in just forty minutes a verdict of guilty was rendered, and the Judge after a long-faced lecture on the terrible nature of the crime of stealing, sentenced him to the chain gang for twelve months. Scarcely had the sheriff removed the culprit when the jury sitting on the riot case came in and rendered a verdict of not guilty; the deduction was, to commit riot and in doing so kill a "Mormon" Elder was no crime in the eyes of the law of the State of Georgia, but to steal a gallon of whisky was simply awful, and demanded swift punishment. The whole scene was so grotesque and absurd that the veriest dolt could not help but see it, and the court and its officers seemed, in some sort of a dim and misty way, to realize that the forum of justice was being made a platform whereon a brutal mob held sway, that bigotry and prejudice had usurped the place of law and order, and that right was being trampled in the mud and mire. Never before did we look upon so pitiable a spectacle as was presented. It was enough to make a man turn with shame and sorrow from the view, and one could not but look with pity and contempt upon the low, grovelling passions that actuated the crowd of "Christians" (?) who filled the court room and sat in the jury box, and who by their actions and expressions demonstrated plainly that they sustained the men who had imbrued their hands in the blood of innocence, and that they stood by

the assertions of the mob. "There is no law in Georgia for Mormons." The courts of the State have sustained them and the issue could not be made plainer.

It is but simple justice to say that these men do not represent the thinking and intelligent part of the community, but are of the ignorant and degraded, and are sustained by the religious bigotry of the orthodox part of the general community who are led blindly by their religious teachers. The liberal element are unsparing in their denunciation of the crime, and a heated discussion has been and will continue to go on in the future that will in the end result in great good to the cause of truth.

The unavenged blood of Joseph Standing cries from the ground for vengeance, the escutcheon of the proud State of Georgia is to-day dark with the stains of the spilt blood of a martyr to the cause of truth; her history has a dark day to account for, her executive and judicial officers will be called to account for the part they have taken in condoning the deed; her citizens will reap the bitter fruit of the seed they have sown; the hand of God will rest heavy upon them in the future, and they will yet know that it had "been better for them never to have been born to have touched one of these little ones." "Touch not mine anointed and do my prophets no harm," has been the burden of the message of Jehovah to the children of men all the way down from Adam to to-day. In his own due time he will call these men to an account, and will not hold the murderer guiltless.

Joseph Standing's name will henceforth be enrolled among the martyrs, side by side with those whose blood has been shed for the word of God and the testimony of Jesus. His history will be penned by the youth of Zion, and the influence of his martyrdom will penetrate every land where the sound of the gospel goes. It will attract the attention of the thoughtful world over, and will become a household word to untold thousands of people. The story of his cruel death and unavenged blood, will attract to the cause he so nobly and manfully died for, thousands of the good, the true and the pure, and in the near future the Saints will rejoice with him, for methinks I hear him say.

Brigham Young Academy Examination.

Editors Deseret News:

On Friday, Oct. 31st, at 9 a. m., commenced an examination of the students of the B. Y. Academy; thus closing the first term of the fourth academic year. On the stand were Pres. A. O. Smoot, Bishop L. E. Harrington, W. H. Dusenberry, Esq., and Mrs. M. J. Coray, of the Board of Directors, teachers of the Academy, and Mrs. Zina D. Young. The tables were spread with specimens of ladies' work, examination papers, maps, diagrams, charts, etc., by the students, general programme and various reports, all of which were afterwards distributed for examination by the committee appointed for that purpose. The exercises were interspersed with singing by the academic choir under the leadership of Mr. Chas. Morris; Miss Netty Southworth presiding at the organ.

After the customary opening exercises, the Principal proceeded to offer a short explanation in regard to the nature and spirit of his report to the Trustees, which it was shown was not compiled for the purpose of eulogizing any one, but simply to demonstrate to the board of directors and the community the nature and extent of labors accomplished in the B. Y. Academy.

Principal Maeser then read the report treating at length on all points connected with the Academy. The totals contained therein showed that 160 students had been registered during the term, of whom 11 had withdrawn; that 304 recitations were held every week distributed among 12 different teachers. Statistics of Theological Department showed 1 Seventy, 6 Elders, 6 Priests, 2 Teachers, 18 Deacons, 91 lay members, 14 not baptized, 10 under age, and 17 non-members registered.

From the Domestic Department Report I clip the following table

according to the homes of the students:

Provo, 100; Lake District, 1; Springville, 2; Spanish Fork, 1; Payson, 4; Goshen, 5; Lehi, 3; Alpine, 1; American Fork, 6; Pleasant Grove, 9; Idaho Terr., 2; Salt Lake County, 7; Tooele County, 4; Juab County, 5; Sanpete County, 1; Millard County, 1; Beaver County, 1; Kane County, 2; Iron County, 2; total 160.

Then followed brief and appropriate addresses by Prest. Smoot, Bishop Harrington, W. H. Dusenberry, Mrs. M. J. Coray and Mrs. Zina D. Young, all congratulating both teachers and pupils on their success and eulogizing the general spirit of the academy and its beneficial results already presenting themselves.

It was announced that a social reunion of the students would take place in the evening, and that the second term would commence on Monday, Nov. 2nd.

Benediction offered and assembly dismissed.
