

INSANE NEGRO DEFIES SHERIFF.

Barricaded Himself in House and
When Posse Appeared Begun
Shooting

KILLED ONE, WOUNDED SEVEN.

A Deputy Who Volunteered to Go to
House Had His Head Literally
Blown Off.

Owensboro, Ky., May 22.—Bob Shaw, a negro, supposedly insane, has killed one man and wounded seven in the past 24 hours, near Waitman. The body of the dead man lies in front of Shaw's house, and the negro continues to defy the officers who are seeking to arrest him.

Yesterday afternoon Shaw was terrorizing the community around Waitman, and an appeal was sent to this city for help. A posse was at once formed, but as soon as they approached the madman's house he opened fire. Marshal Watson was shot in the face and Deputy Marshal Jackson in the back. Others wounded were Dr. C. H. Pitt, on the hand; a boy named Howard and a boy named Kelly, in the legs.

This morning a posse headed by Sheriff Kelly went from Lewisport to Waitman and found Shaw sitting on his front porch. Shaw quickly barricaded himself in his house.

The posse tried to storm the house, but the negro opened fire, wounding James Ford and John Robinson. He apparently used only small shot, which saved the lives of those he aimed at. Shaw was shot at twice. He had two revolvers, but announced that he would save them for work at close range. A great crowd gathered around the house, keeping a safe distance away. This afternoon Will Brown, a deputy sheriff of Hancock county, volunteered to go to the house and take Shaw. When he was within 15 feet of Shaw the crazy man fired, blowing Brown's head completely off.

THE BAPTISTS WANT SENATOR SMOOT EXPELLED

St. Louis, May 22.—Interest in tonight's meeting of the American Baptist Publication society, as a part of the National Baptist anniversary, centered on the report of the resolutions committee, which submitted a strongly worded resolution denouncing "Mormonism" and asking for the expulsion of United States Senator Smoot of Utah.

The report was unanimously adopted without discussion, and copies were ordered sent to President Roosevelt, Vice President Fairbanks, Speaker Cannon and Senator Burrows, chairman of the committee on elections. The resolution was worded as follows:

"Whereas, The recent congressional investigations have shown that the Mormon hierarchy is openly defying the laws, both state and national, therefore, be it
Resolved, That we urge upon Congress the necessity of radical action for the removal of the manifest evils of Mormonism.
Resolved, That we call on the United States senate to expel Reed Smoot of Utah from that body as unworthy of membership."

Sisters Sail for Laper Colony.

Vancouver, B. C., May 22.—Three sisters of charity sailed from this port by the steamer Empress of India today to spend their lives in the Laper colony at Kumantu, Japan, where there are 400 lepers.

His Leg Torn Off.

Vancouver, B. C., May 22.—John Gray, a logger of Drury Inlet, B. C., was fatally injured having one of his legs torn off at the thigh in a logging accident. He was taken in a towboat 20 miles to Alert bay to catch the steamer for Vancouver, but missed the ship and no medical aid was available.

A Swindler Arrested.

Chicago, May 22.—William T. McKee, has been arrested here charged with being the manager of a "get-rich-quick" concern which has branches in many other cities, and according to police, has swindled thousands of persons. The proposition submitted to subscribers by the company was that after paying \$1.25 for five weeks, they would receive a diamond valued at \$200.

CHICAGO UNIVERSITY.

Worth Between Eighteen and
Nineteen Million Dollars.

Chicago, May 22.—According to the biennial statement of President Harper of the University of Chicago, the university is now worth between 18 and 19 million dollars. The exact amount of assets as shown in the auditor's report on June 30, 1904, is \$18,047,910, an increase over the amount of the same date the previous year of \$62,216. A corresponding increase for the year since the auditor's last report would make the present worth fully exceed \$18,000,000.

President Harper presents the report of the committee on the establishment of a school of technology which recommends a curriculum, consisting of mathematics, chemistry, physics and languages. The president also reports the establishment of museums in the department of geology, paleontology, anthropology, history, commerce and zoology, as well as the other museums of the botanical and the biblical departments.

FIRE DAMP EXPLOSION.

Seventeen Persons Killed by One
In Styria.

Vienna, May 22.—According to news received from Liezen, in Styria, 17 persons have been killed by an explosion caused by fire damp in the Horskuck tunnel there. The explosion took place in the lower galleries on the southern side of the tunnel. There were 17 men in the tunnel at the time, and it is feared that all have perished. Several attempts at rescue were made, but all of them failed, the members of the rescue party having been overcome by the gases. The completed portion of the tunnel was not damaged, the tunnel is being bored through the Horskuck mountain in connection with a second railway to Trieste.

Internal Revenue Collections.

Washington, May 22.—The monthly statement of the collections of internal revenue shows that for the month of April, 1905, the total receipts were \$17,462,291, a decrease as compared with April, 1904, of \$197,152. For the ten months of the present fiscal year the total receipts were \$154,451,095, which is a decrease as compared with the corresponding period of 1904 of \$615,510.

Russian Cavalry Repulsed.

Tokio, May 22.—Noon.—Imperial army headquarters reporting today says:

"The Russian cavalry which detoured toward Kakenen from the right bank of the Liao river was frequently defeated by our rear guards. On May 20, after their failure in the vicinity of Tse-fu, they camped with the main strength at Suotatsu, 25 miles from Kakenen, and on May 21 they retreated to the right bank of the Malien river. In the morning a few companies of the enemy's force remained on the left bank of the Malien river were defeated and retreated northward in disorder.
"Otherwise the situation is unchanged."

COLD BLOODED MURDER.

Prominent Lawyer of Savannah
Shot at His Office Door.

Savannah, Ill., May 22.—Daniel S. Berry, who was prominent as a lawyer and who was an ex-member of the legislature, was shot and killed today at the door of his office rooms. Mr. Berry had just come from home and was unlocking the door of his office when he was shot from behind, one bullet striking him in the arm and the other penetrating his brain. He died instantly. There were no witnesses to the tragedy and there are no developments throwing any light upon the mystery.

Deaths from Plague in India.

London, May 22.—Three-quarters of a million of people have already died of the plague in India this year, according to figures furnished by Indian Secy. Brookfield in the house of commons. The mortality from June to April 1 was 431,744, while another 215,000 succumbed during the four weeks ending April 20.

HYDROPHOBIA FROM SCARE

Child Has It, Being Knocked
Down by Dog But Not Bitten.

San Francisco, May 22.—A peculiar case is interesting the physicians of two hospitals of this city, 20 medical men at one time have been in consultation over the patient. Some months ago Dorothy Keeney, aged 10 years, living at 233 Waller street, was knocked down by a large dog of the mastiff breed but was not bitten. Recently the child developed symptoms of hydrophobia and was removed to the children's hospital, where unmistakable indications were manifested of the dread disease. The child was then removed to the French hospital, where noted specialists were called in without avail. The barking of the girl finally reached such stage that other patients were disturbed and she was returned to the Children's hospital. She is now in a comatose condition and death is expected.

REFORMS IN MOROCCO.

Sultan Admits Are Necessary but
Can't Conform.

London, May 22.—The Times' Tangier correspondent learns that the sultan of Morocco will reply to the French proposals admitting that reforms are necessary, but regretting his inability to conform to French wishes unless all signatories to the treaty of Madrid agree to the means for carrying them out.

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GOLDFIELD BANK GOES TO THE WALL

Nevada Mining Town Receives Its
First Real Financial
Shock.

THE LIABILITIES ARE \$82,000

President Young Disclaims All Re-
sponsibility—Blames Cashier
And Directors.

Goldfield, Nev., May 22.—When banking hour arrived this morning the following notice was posted on the door of the Goldfield Bank & Trust company: "This bank will be closed until a meeting of the directors can be held." J. B. Young, the president, left several days ago, and is believed to be in San Francisco. J. R. Boals, the cashier, left last night. The liabilities are approximately \$82,000, and the assets are approximately \$4,800. A meeting of creditors was held today, and a committee appointed to investigate the affairs of the defunct institution. There is said to be no danger of a run on the other banks of the city which are declared to be in perfectly sound condition.

Goldfield, Nev., May 22.—The liabilities of the Goldfield Bank and Trust company, which failed today are \$78,227. The assets so far discovered are \$4,821, of which \$4,800 is in notes. There was \$16 in the vault and a five dollar gold piece was found under the counter.

The most disorganized state of affairs seems to exist in the books of the bank. J. B. Young, president of the bank, is in the hands of the Goldfield Lida Investment company. Two checks drawn on the John Cook Bank here by W. R. Hale of San Francisco, each for \$5,000, in favor of Francis L. Burton, promoter of the Goldfield Lida Investment company, were recently paid by the insolvent bank. One of these checks was dated the 23rd and was paid on the 26th. It was evidently presented at the Cook bank by the Goldfield Bank and Trust company as it is stamped "No funds." W. R. Hale having no account there.

Cashier James R. Boals was found at Hawthorne late tonight. A telegram has been received from Burton in San Francisco denying that he has anything to do with the failed bank and stating that President Young is there with the bank's collateral endeavoring to get assistance.

YOUNG'S DISCLAIMER.

San Francisco, May 22.—J. B. Young, president of the Goldfield Bank and Trust company, tonight declared that he had nothing to do with bringing about the crisis in the bank's affairs. He declared that he was opposed to the manner in which the bank was conducted by its cashier, and directors. According to Young he sold his stock in the bank and denies that he fled from Goldfield. On the contrary he says that he came to San Francisco for a brief trip and that he intends to return to the mining town as soon as possible.

Young does not believe that the liabilities of the bank will exceed \$100,000 and he says that it should have assets enough to meet this amount.

Debate Ends in Wrangle.

New York, May 22.—A debate which was begun in the Metropolitan temple at Eighteenth street and Seventh avenue has wound up in a wrangle in the street, where 250 persons ordered from the church by the pastor, were finally dispersed by the police. Socialists were blamed for the trouble by Pastor Bagwell.

As a result of the scene the weekly open parliament which have been a feature of the church for the last 10 years will be abandoned. The future meetings being so conducted that there will be no opportunity for argument on socialism and religious rancor.
