LOCAL BRIEFS.

Among these is Logan, the mayor of which, William Edwards, and the members of his council, called on Governor Cutler yesterday for the purpose of discussing with him the plan for placing a commission on a sewer system in Logan. The matter depends largely upon new legislation and the increased bonding power of cities.

WITNESSES IN STOCKADE CASE

Subpoenas Served on Members
Of the Demi Monde to
Appear Tomorrow.

MAYOR ALSO WILL TESTIFY

Plaintiffs to Show Cause Why the Restraining Order Issued by Judge Morse Should Be Permanent.

The citizens of the west side, who have been the most vigorous in their protests against the introduction of a red light, stockaded district into their midst, won the first skirmish in their great fight for decency, when Judge Morse granted their petition asking for a temporary restraining order, preventing the promoters of the nefarious traffic, from occupying the newly erected monuments to shame, under the law which provides against a common law nuisance.

This temporary order was granted several days ago, and late last night the citizens of the west side of the city commenced when the attorneys for the plaintiffs issued subpoenas commanding 16 of the more active promoters of indecency, and those who have been in one way or another, to come before the court of Judge Morse tomorrow morning. These witnesses are summoned to appear and testify to the matter, because at that time the plaintiffs must show cause for making the restraining order against the promoters of the red light crime, permanent.

MARTIN'S PLANS. Among those summoned by the plaintiffs for the purpose of proving that the proposed wholesale deal in unwholesome crime is a common law nuisance, the name of Councilman L. D. Martin, "American" party member of the city council, prominent in the management of machine politics, and also the architect for the greatest prostitution, who is commanded to appear before the court and produce the plans for the erection of the Citizens' Investment company, Belle London, et al.

Nearly all the names appearing on the list of summoned witnesses are those appearing in the complaint of the original action. They are: Ada Wilson, the keeper of a Commercial street disorderly house, ex-Chief of Police Tom D. Pitt, Madge Daniels, L. D. Martin, Edna Prescott, M. W. Wolsinger, Dora B. Topham, Martin E. Mulvey, Beatrice Bartlett, C. E. Raybourn, John Howard, Frank McDonald, R. S. McDonald, H. B. Crandall, George Gray and Mayor John S. Bransford.

With the exception of Dora Topham, the women named in the list of witnesses for the plaintiff, are keepers of houses of ill fame in Victoria alley and Commercial street, and are being called to the witness stand in consequence of having been charged on the subject of removing to the stockade. Mayor Bransford and Tom D. Pitt have both been more or less officially connected with the stockade proposition.

If the plaintiffs are able to establish the facts alleged in their petition for the restraining order, that the proposed stockade is illegal, immoral and indecent, there is every reason to believe that the court will make the order perpetual, in which case the decent citizens who object to the establishing of the iniquitous place in the midst of the district, will have won the fight, and the proposition will have ceased to exist as more than a bad dream.

WEATHER BUREAU TO MOVE. The local weather bureau will be moved from the Dooly block to the top floor of the Boston block on its completion, June 1, as that is the highest building in the city, and roof preparations are now being made at the building. The bureau was first located in the Godbe-Pitts building, corner of Main and First South streets, March 19, 1874. In June, 1876, it was moved to the Wasatch building, now the Kenyon hotel, and in July, 1881, was removed to the Board of Trade block, where it remained until March, 1889, when the bureau was removed to the Dooly block. A complete new set of door equipment will be installed on the Boston block.
