LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Salt Lake Collegiate Institute has opened with 100 pupils, and the number is increasing. The Gordon Academy also began with a very fair attendance.

This evening at 8 o'clock services will be held at the Temple E. N. S. Tabernacle. The sermon will be on the subject, "Echoes of Religious Activity During the Summer."

E. C. Leophauro, chairman of the Republians, convened a called committee meeting for 8 o'clock last night in the rooms of the Young Men's Republican club in the Atlas block.

Jennie Johnson, daughter of C. P. Johnson of Green River, Utah, was yesterday appointed at the Green River Hospital to attend her and is getting along as well as can be expected.

The large shade trees which made the front of the old St. James hotel so attractive on a warm day, have been put down by the management of the Lyric Theater, which has taken the place of the old hotel.

The marble work of the Federal building has been completed, but the postmaster does not know when the building can be occupied on account of the delay in shipment of the letter boxes from Germany.

The Salt Lake County horticultural society will meet Saturday, Sept. 9, at 1 o'clock, in the city and county building. The purpose of the meeting is to make plans for the coming state fair. All fruit growers are invited to attend.

A fair will be given next Monday night, in the Eighteenth ward meeting house, to Elder Harry Shepard who is about to leave on a mission to Germany. A fine program has been prepared for the occasion.

Secretary Cox of the D. A. & M. society has arranged with the American Legion Club in this city, to have an exhibition at the coming state fair, 250 dogs representing 35 breeds. The exhibition, it is believed, will be the best ever given in this state.

The New Thought Science league will meet at the home of one of its members, W. H. Lee, 23rd Street. The subject for discussion is "Wireless Telegraphy." Henry Harrison Brown, president of the national league, will lecture in Salt Lake Sept. 18 at Unity hall on "New Thought."

He will speak at the First Methodist church today, while holding a conference with ministers at the Y. M. C. A. building this afternoon. The general interest of Mr. Vogt in Christian Endeavor work is particularized on this tour of bettering the organization of the union among societies.

Twentieth ward Sunday school teachers numbering something over 50, met in the ward amusement hall last evening and sat down to a spread that included all of the delicacies of the season. Speeches were made and a general time of enjoyment participated in. After the banquet dancing occupied the remainder of the evening. **ENGINEER PLANS
TO DRAIN CITY.**

Has Scheme to Dispose of Surface Water and Sewage in Lower Districts.

WANTS THREE STORM SEWERS.

Will Prevent Damage to Property and Greatly Improve Sanitary Conditions.

A plan to dispose of the surface water and sewage which runs through the city and frequently causes damage and inconvenience is now under consideration by City Engineer Miller and his assistants. At present all of such water and sewage finds its way to the Ninth South street canal, and as there is not fall enough in the canal to carry the sewage off to the river, it gathers and causes a menace to the health of the community. Engineer Miller believes that the construction of three intercepting storm sewers across the city from east to west will solve the problem, and if the matter of cost can be arranged, the plan will probably be carried out.

The first of the sewers would be constructed so as to care for the water from the Ninth South street and part of the east bench, and carry it through the North Temple street canal. The second would be along Fourth South street and would handle all of the surface water north to North Temple. The third sewer will be along Ninth South street and will care for the water between Fourth and Ninth South streets. There would be sufficient fall in the two upper sewers to carry the water to the river all right, and in relieving the Ninth South street sewer from carrying all of the rest of their burden, the fall in them would be sufficient to carry a small amount of water and sewage to the river all right.

The sewers will be covered and manholes will be placed at frequent intervals to admit the surface water and sewage. It is believed that the question of funds for the work will be arranged all right, as it is absolutely necessary that some steps be taken at once to remedy the condition of the Ninth South street canal.

THE HAND OF MAN."

Colored Methodist Bishop to Speak in Assembly Hall Monday Night.

Right Rev. Bishop R. E. Lee, D. D. La L. D. of Wilberforce, O., one of the bishops of the African Methodist Episcopal church, will arrive in Salt Lake tomorrow and preach Sunday morning and evening at the Old Palms hall on Market street, at which meetings the public will be made welcome. On Monday night the distinguished lecturer, "The Hand of Man" in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, the lecture lasting from 7:30 to 9 p. m. From 9:30 to 11:30 p. m. Monday, the bishop will be tendered a grand reception at the Old Fellow's hall, the same being under theauspices of the A. M. E. church in the city.

Bishop Lee is one of the best educated colored men in America, and is one of the representatives of a church that is 110 years old, with a membership of 800,000, 13 bishops, 62 annual conferences, 50 in the United States and 12 in foreign lands. The church owns and controls 13 colleges and schools. To maintain these colleges and schools it is necessary to raise and spend thousands of dollars each year. The church has a total of 1,000 buildings, mostly in Philadelphia and other cities in Nashville, where it publishes all of its literature. The organization is doing good work and the receipts of the bishop's lecture are to be spent in helping to build churches and support schools.
