Spraying Apple Trees.

The Yeomans, of Walworth, are among the largest and most successful orchardists in Western New York, and we copy from the Country Gentleman their account of the methods practiced by them:

We notice inquiry of A. L. S. about spraying apple trees with Paris green to deatroy insects. Having had much experience, we can speak of this mat-ter understandingly. First, London purple answers a bet-ter purpose than Paris green, because it is icheaper, mixes well with water and does not require to be stirred to keep it well mingled, as Paris green does. About one pound of London purple to 100 gallons of water is a suit-able proportion, first mixing the pur-

Among the good works authorized by the legislature of New York is the formation of a park at Niagara Falls, by which all the grounds and waters necessary for the preservation and public access to those great wonders of nature are secured to the people in perpetuity. The sum of \$1,500,000 has been appropriated by the State to se-cure the purchase of private property. Lands equal to a little more than 100 acres have been bought. The grounds and buildings on both sides of River and Canal streets west and south of the hydraulic canal have been taken by the park commissioners. The lines ex-tend to the main channel of the river, the middle of Horse Shoe Falls, being the boundary line between Canada and the United States, and the purchase the United States, and the purchase takes in Goat Island and all the little slets, with their various mills, street

islets, with their various mills, streets and passage ways. By the terms of the act the whole tract is to be restored as far as possi-ble to its original state of nature, and when this is accomplished, the trees grown, and all the improvements per-fected, the attractions of Ningara will be increased a thousand fold. The original inception of this admirable project is due to Lord Dufferin when he was Governor General of Canada in 1878.
