Logan, Cache Co., June 14.—Articles of incorporation of the Wellsville Mercantile company were filed with County Clerk Farrar Friday. The new company is to be organized for the purpose of operating a general store in the town of Wellsville. The shares are 10,000 of \$5 each. R. K. Kurr is president; John Wyatt, vice president; John L. Haxter, secretary. E. B. Owen, treasurer, and Thomas Leishman, William Parker and John S. Leatham are other directors.
