THE INFLUENZA. The Plague Daily Spreading in Berlin and Throughout Germany. JEWISH COLONIES IN SOUTH AMERICA. Three Trains Piled Up Together—Many Persons Reported Killed.

THE INFLUENZA (Continued). The epidemic is spreading in the country. Berlin, Dec. 4.—The epidemic of influenza which has been prevailing in this city for some time past, is daily spreading and the number of persons afflicted with the disease is much more violent type than that which prevailed here two years ago, and many deaths are reported. No reports have been received from London and municipal officials have been interfered with, owing to the illness of many of those connected with the various departments. A similar state of affairs exists in the different public offices. Even the railroad lines and other concerns having a large number of employees are seriously affected. The hospitals are crowded to their utmost capacity and from many parts of the country come reports of widespread suffering from the disease.

JEWISH COLONIES. They are said to prosper in the Argentine Republic. Washington, Dec. 4.—The Bureau of American Republics is informed that the work of installing the Jewish colonies, sent to the Argentine Republic by the assistance of Baron Hirsch, is being actively carried out. The Marazion colony is estimated to have 200 families comfortably settled and engaged in the cultivation of the soil. Two thousand additional families are reported to be on their way from Europe, and it is proposed to bring them, however, at a rate of a thousand families a month.
