ST. PETERSBURG, 20.—An Im- perial order has been issued prohib- iting military men from publicly de- livering political speeches, or ex- pressing political opinions. The war department officials are prohibited from publishing, without the sanc- tion of their superiors, documents referring to internal and external affairs of foreign countries.

LONDON, 21.—The Times has a violent article relative to the de- bate in the Commons last night. It recommends before further remedial measures are proposed the agitation should be crushed at all costs, as it could be done in a couple of months if the Government was free from the constitutional trammels which its adversaries never think of respecting.

About 736 families, consisting of 3,829 persons, were evicted in Ireland the first quarter of 1892.

DUBLIN, 21.—Arrests under the coercion act up to Tuesday as 918. The police patrol surprised a large body of moonlighters at Baby- bunion, near the house of a farmer recently shot. The police fired upon the party and several were wound- ed.

VIENNA, 21.—The Presse says: Intelligence from Odessa confirms the reports of outrages at Balta, which were of the most horrible character. Two thousand Jewish families are ruined. Whole streets were wrecked, and the plundering lasted two days. The riots almost assumed the character of a struggle for the annihilation of the Jews, the assailants being peasants from the neighborhood of the town. Ilopoli, near Odessa, was also surprised by peasants, presumably under the leadership of Nihilists. The houses of Jews were sacked and the town partially burned.

BERLIN, 21.—The committee of prominent citizens of all denomina- tions formed for the purpose of pro- moting the emigration of Jews from Russia, has already raised 100,000 marks.

LONDON, 21.—The riots in Cam- borne, Cornwall, growing out of ill- feeling against Irish miners, was re- newed last night. The mob stoned the police, who charged on them. Several of the police and populace were injured.

A serious riot occurred at Ruabon, Wales, owing to the strike of col- liers. The rioters did great damage to property. A detachment of mil- itia was sent to quell the distur- bances.
