Scandinavian Mission.—The following is an extract from a letter, dated at Copenhagen, Jan. 17, from Elder N. C. Flygare, to Brother S. P. Neve of this city—

"When I first came here I was called to labor in Stockholm conference, where I presided about seven months; then I was called to preside over the Scandinavian Mission, and in that position have been much blessed. The mission is in a very good condition; some are being added to the Church all the time. We baptized 818 last year and the good work is progressing. We don't meet with as much opposition now as we used to in years gone by, having liberty to preach wherever we go. I have found in my travels in Sweden, Norway and Denmark, that the prejudice against us as a people is not as it was once. When I have told the people I was an Elder from Utah, they have received me with marked attention.

"The condition of the working classes is deplorable; thousands are out of employment and a good deal of suffering is the result.

"I feel proud of my mountain home and the privilege of being a representative of so noble a people as the Latter-day Saints, and I am trying to make myself as useful as possible in the interests of the Kingdom of God."

Washington's Birthday.—Tomorrow will be the 22nd day of February, and consequently the anniversary of the birth of that noble son of America, George Washington, the Father of his Country, of sacred memory. In honor of the occasion we understand that most of the banks, stores and other places of business will be closed tomorrow. Having no desire to be behind others in doing honor to the memory of so good and heroic a man, besides believing that occasional days of relaxation from the cares of business are by no means undesirable, the next number of the NEWS will not be issued till Wednesday evening.

Dedicatory Services.—Yesterday afternoon the Sixth Ward new School-house was dedicated. There were present on the stand, besides Bishop Hickenlooper and his counselors, President Brigham Young and Elders John Taylor and A. M. Musser.

After singing by the choir, Elder John Taylor offered the dedicatory prayer. President Young delivered a highly interesting discourse, replete with excellent instruction, dwelling with particular unction on the necessity of the Saints aiding the scattered poor of the Lord's people to gather here with the main body of the church, and enjoined it as a special and imperative duty on all who were indebted to the Perpetual Emigrating Fund to meet their liabilities in that direction as fast as possible, that the means may be used in propelling the work of gathering.

He was followed, in the same strain, by Elder Taylor, in a short and spirited address. The closing prayer was offered by Elder Musser.

The meeting was held in the upper room, which is to be used for religious services, and is admirably arranged and adapted for that purpose. At the west end is an elegant stand, over which is a life-sized lithographic portrait of President Young. In front of the stand is an enclosure, surrounded by a railing, for the sacrament table, and at the east end of the hall is a stand, with graded seats for the chorists, also raised in, and the woodwork has all been neatly painted.

The lower room is well adapted for school purposes, for which it is used, Brother William Willes having school there now.

The whole structure and apportionments is a monument of the public spiritedness of the authorities of the ward and the people generally, being solely the result of their voluntary donations.

Resolutions of Respect.—The following was handed in for publication this morning—

At a special meeting of the Salt Lake City Fire Department, held Saturday, Feb. 9th, senior foreman, C. M. Donelson, was called to the chair. On motion, R. W. McAllister was chosen to act as secretary, and H. H. Goddard, assistant secretary, when the following preamble and resolutions were adopted—

PREAMBLE.

Whereas—The retirement of our esteemed fellow-citizen, John D. T. McAllister, from the office of Chief

Engineer of the Salt Lake City Fire Department presents a suitable opportunity for expressing the esteem in which we hold him as a faithful and courteous public servant. Therefore be it

Resolved—That the thanks of this meeting and the entire department are due to John D. T. McAllister, for the able and impartial manner in which he has uniformly performed his public duties, and that we sincerely regret his determination to retire from the duties of said office.

Resolved—That he carries with him, on retiring from the position which he has so ably and satisfactorily filled, the regards and good wishes of all who had occasion to labor or transact official business with him.

Resolved—That we, the officers and members of the said department, regard his retirement from the office of chief engineer as a loss to us, while we sincerely hope that it will prove a gain to him, and trust that his future will be as bright and prosperous as he can anticipate or desire.

Resolved—That we, the members of the Fire Department, retain him as an honorary member of the same.

Resolved—That the secretary of this meeting be requested to transmit to him the preamble and resolutions adopted on this occasion.

BY TELEGRAPH.

MADRID, 15.—It is officially announced that the Carlists were completely defeated on the 13th by Gen. Quesada, in the formidable positions which they occupied at El Queta. Don Carlos and his forces fled towards Villa Real and Summaraga, pursued by Quesada. The latter passed the night at Vergara. Gen. Moriones has occupied the Carlist line of fortifications and entered Zumaya.

The Cortes opened to-day by the King in person. The King, addressing the Senators and Deputies from the throne, said—

"The ill-advised Prince who is waging civil war has been reduced to powerlessness and can obtain no advantages. I shall speedily proceed north to contribute to the restoration of peace. My relations with foreign powers are friendly. Negotiations are being carried on with the United States in a friendly spirit, and afford reason to hope for prompt and satisfactory settlement. The representatives of Spain at the Vatican are engaged in regulating pending questions in a manner required by the interests of Church and State. My Government will lay before you a statement of the financial condition, which has been much impaired. The conclusion of peace, which is fortunately near at hand, can alone enable us to procure necessary sources of revenue, in order to remedy existing evils. Through your patriotism the budget will be balanced and all public creditors be paid, so far as possible, without neglecting the development of the productive forces of the nation. Our honor and rights are threatened and even jeopardized in Cuba, whither 32,000 troops have been sent since my accession. The Cuban war has not prevented the emancipation of 76,000 slaves. We shall uphold the integrity of Cuban territory."

The speech concludes as follows—

"Inasmuch as the provinces of Biscay and Alava and the greater part of Navarre have been reduced to obedience, as the Carlists are hemmed in against the Pyrenees, and as the Cuban insurrection daily becomes more feeble, my short but difficult reign has not been without good to the public. The efforts of Spain to preserve her place in the world show what she will accomplish when her strength is no longer wasted in sterile agitations. Heaven grant her a speedy recompense for our painful sacrifices."

During the delivery of the speech the king was frequently greeted with cheers, and at the passage about emancipation of slaves the cheers were loud and long continued.

SUEZ, 16.—A Burmese embassy has arrived here on the way to Europe.
