LOCAL BRIEFS.

Local nursery men report a steady  
sale of trees, with good prospects for  
the future.

Fish Commissioner John Sharp ex-  
pects to have 1,250,000 brook trout eggs  
in the state hatchery before Feb. 1.

Rev. W. H. V. Taylor, colored, of  
Butte, began a series of revival meet-  
ings in the Calvary Baptist church last  
evening.

Work continues on the new home of  
the Country club, as the weather does  
not necessarily stop operations there,  
though it may on the grounds.

Mrs. Johanna Melton identified promi-  
nently with the work of several wom-  
en's organizations in this city, is now  
only ill at her residence with paralysis.

There will be a civil service exami-  
nation in this city Jan. 31, for vacancies  
in the composing and proof rooms of  
the governmental printing office at Ma-  
nilla, at \$1,600 per year.

Ezra Thompson, Jr., aged 8, son of the  
mayor, is confined to his bed with  
spinal trouble, following pneumonia,  
and will have to remain in one position  
for nearly a month.

A series of revival meetings was be-  
gun yesterday, in the East Side Ba-  
ptist church under the direction of Evan-  
gelist William F. Coburn of Boston.

Thomas Fallon, employed on the tele-  
graph gang of the Rio Grande Western,  
reported to the police Saturday night  
that a new suit of clothes, for which  
he had just paid \$25, had been stolen  
from him. A man who left the employ-  
ment of the company on Saturday is sus-  
pected of stealing the suit.

The Western Union has begun string-  
ing an additional wire between this  
city and Ogden, over the Rio Grande.  
This makes nine wires along the Rio  
Grande right of way, and 15 over the  
Short Line. The new wire will be  
quadruplex, making eight wires in that  
class of service between Salt Lake and  
Ogden.

The Kansas City Implement Trade  
Journal prints a special, New Year's  
number, a feature of which is a page  
and a half review of agricultural com-  
modities obtained in the intermountain  
country for the past year, and with a  
large photographic view of Salt Lake  
City and the vignette of its Salt Lake  
correspondent.

An autopsy has been performed upon  
the body of the Greek found near Hell's  
Hollow on Thursday. The examination  
was conducted by County Physician  
Whitney who stated that it was his  
belief the man committed suicide. The  
bullet, the same caliber as those in the  
gun found by the side of the body, was  
removed from the head.

Roofs are reported leaky all over  
town. This is due to the accumulation  
of snow along the eaves and the forma-  
tion of ice there, which retains the  
water instead of allowing it to run off  
the roofs and down the sides of the  
houses and causes trouble. The result is  
that the cornice men are having their  
hands full in repairing damages.

The W. C. T. U. has arranged to have  
Marie C. Brahm, president of the Illi-  
nois W. C. T. U. lecture in this city,  
on the evening of the 18th inst. Miss  
Brahm is one of the most talented  
speakers in the order, and addressed a  
large congregation in the First Presby-  
terian church just before her departure  
for Los Angeles.

The eighth A grade in the public  
schools will hold graduating exercises  
in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium on the  
15th and 16th insts, with the principal  
address from Prof. W. M. Stewart, The  
Lincoln, Lowell, Union, Lafayette and  
Bryant schools will be represented.  
Classes for these students will be or-  
ganized in the High school on the 22nd.

Samuel Newhouse has given \$25 to be  
used toward the purchase of a library  
for the Newhouse school. The pupils  
of this school held a very enjoyable  
masse festival, with a tree, and a box  
of candies for each child from the local  
mercantile company. Mr. Newhouse's  
check was one of the presents. The  
teacher, Mrs. Charlotte D. Bell, is ill in  
this city, at the residence of her moth-  
er, Mrs. Anna Dibble, 227 Kensington  
ave.

Real estate men are becoming chary  
of publicly referring to sales until the  
bargains have been clinched, and all  
names down in black and white. It  
has been discovered through sad ex-  
perience, that property owners are  
liable to take fright and flight from  
prospective dealers if the auctioneer  
should occur to them, or should it be  
hinted to them in any way, that they  
are about to sell at a sacrifice of future  
profit.

Secy. A. W. Raybold of the Elks is  
in receipt, for distribution, of a large  
number of southern California views  
arranged in a booklet, shaped and col-  
ored like a ripe navel orange. This is  
in view of the coming Los Angeles ex-  
cursion, when it is believed that the  
original estimate of 200 excursionists  
will be increased to nearer 500. The  
unique and illustrated folders in col-  
ors are attracting considerable atten-  
tion.

Fraulein Stolle, the German lecturer,  
gave an interesting talk on "Old  
Friends and New in the Realm of Art,"  
under the auspices of the State Art  
Institute, the Students' Art club and  
the Ladies' Literary in Barratt hall,  
Saturday night. She regretted there  
was not more commercialism in art,  
and said, "If you knew how artists  
starve, or half starve, you would real-  
ize there is no commercialism in their  
art." A plea was made for the re-  
newment of art in this country.

At Saturday night's meeting of the  
Commercial club the directors' action  
was endorsed in opposing the parcels  
post bill now before Congress. It was  
pointed out that under this law 11  
pounds could be sent through the mail  
for 25 cents, and that this would place  
all small dealers completely at the  
mercy of the big department stores in

the big cities. The proposed excursion  
of business men and manufacturers  
through the state was endorsed, as was  
also the idea of holding a mass meet-  
ing in the Theater in the near future.

Move to Establish One for Juvenile  
Court Boys.

The committee appointed by the State  
Federation of Women's clubs to take  
action towards securing an industrial  
farm to be used in connection with the  
juvenile courts of the state, held a  
meeting on Saturday and decided to  
send a letter to each member of the  
next Legislature with a view to secur-  
ing old from the state in establishing  
the farm as a state institution as a part  
of the juvenile court system. The in-  
dustrial farm will be run on the Mor-  
ris school plan, and will afford a  
healthy place for boys and girls who  
are charges of the various juvenile  
courts of the state, and will also give  
them employment in a beneficial na-

SALT LAKE MEN  
IN NEW CONCERN

Organize Utah-Pacific Coal and  
Navigation Company Under  
Laws of Arizona.

STEAMSHIP LINE TO HONOLULU

Company Proposes to Operate From  
San Pedro Harbor and Furnish  
Market for Utah Coal.

The Utah Pacific Coal & Navigation  
company is the name of a new corpora-  
tion that has just been launched under  
the laws of Arizona in which a number  
of Salt Lake men figure conspicuously.  
The incorporators and officers are:  
President, C. O. Harris; vice president,  
R. E. Miller; secretary, J. B. Jensen;  
treasurer, W. H. Bywater, who with H.  
J. Faust Jr., constitute the board of di-  
rectors.

Mr. Jensen, the secretary, who has  
been in California for sometime looking  
after matters on that end of the line,  
has returned to the city with the report  
that the company will be ready to  
begin the transportation of passengers  
and freight by water within the next 90  
days, when a line of steamships will  
be established between San Pedro harbor  
and Honolulu. The company, he states,  
has chartered two steamships, which  
will be used until the corporation can  
get ships of its own construction, which  
will probably take about two years.

Mr. Jensen and his associates have  
been working on the formation of the  
company for about a year, and they  
have made considerable progress. The  
city of Los Angeles, which city has  
no direct communication with Honolu-  
lu at the present time, it being neces-  
sary to ship via San Francisco port.  
But it is proposed to furnish a new  
market on the coast for Utah coal, and  
other products, and in that way, the  
industries of this city will receive di-  
rect benefit.

AFTER GRAZING LANDS.

Utah and Idaho Stockmen Negoti-  
ating for Red Desert.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 6.—A syndi-  
cate of "Mormon" stockmen from  
Idaho and Utah, headed by Mr. Lou  
Marks of Coeurville, is negotiating with  
the Union Pacific land department for  
the lease or purchase of a large tract  
of winter grazing lands in the Red de-  
sert, in sweetwater county, Wyo. The  
syndicate has offered the railroad com-  
pany a much better price than is now  
being paid by the Carbon and Sweet-  
water County Wool Growers' associa-  
tion, which has been leasing the Red  
desert for several years, and the latter  
feared they will lose the valuable winter  
pasture to the newcomers. Meetings  
of the Carbon and Sweetwater County  
associations will be held tomorrow, and  
in all probability the decision will be  
reached to raise the bid of Mr. Marks  
and his associates.
