AMERICAN.
A Town Laid in Ruins by the
Storm.
CHICAGO, 19.—The storm referred
to in last night's dispatches devel-
oped into a still greater violence to-
wards morning, and the wind and
rain did considerable damage in the
city. This morning the Western
Union Telegraph Company had 81
wires down, and communication
was severed in nearly every direc-
tion. Reports from such towns as
were cut off indicated that the
storm has been wide spread, and
has done serious injury in many
towns. In the northeast, south and
west it continues unabated. No
fatal disasters have been reported,
although many roads which were
out last night might have sufficed.
The wires are gradually being
repaired, and it is turning cold
now, and threatening snow.

DE LEPESSE'S STORY TO THE FRENCH.
NEW YORK, 19.—A Herald's
Paris special says: The *Figaro* pub-
lisher has just received from M.
de Lesseps, in which the writer says
that all the obstacles to the con-
struction of the Panama Canal have
been swept away. The feasibility of
its execution has been demonstrated
theoretically and practically. All
impediments have been removed by
the will of the American people,
unitedly expressed in public meet-
ings, and also by the United States
Government. He can follow no
other policy than that which is
dictated by public opinion. This is
also the general opinion of the
delegates to the conference held at
Boston, and the Senator from
Maine for his alleged impudence.
The report is current (not fully
substantiated) that M. de Lesseps
is to be named as the agent for
France, presently returns to
Paris, and the department of
foreign affairs. In the event, Shida,
former sub-commissioner to
Russia, goes to France, Yait-
Kovars, member of the ancient
nobility and King's councillor,
is appointed to Russia and
the latter was once envoy to China,
and later an officer of the consul-
ary senate. Nabesim, the new
envoy to the United States, is
comparatively modern order of
nobility of Danimo. It is noticeable
that several recent diplomatic ap-
pointments are conferred upon
young men.

YOKOHAMA.—The recent re-
distribution of government offices re-
quires further explanation. Upon the
restoration of the imperial rule, in 1868,
the government was organized into
departments, each headed by a minister
belonging to the new party was very
limited. Consequently the members
of the Privy Council, called Sanji,
had to be divided into two classes,
one belonging to the old party and
the other to the new party. The
project was under consideration for
